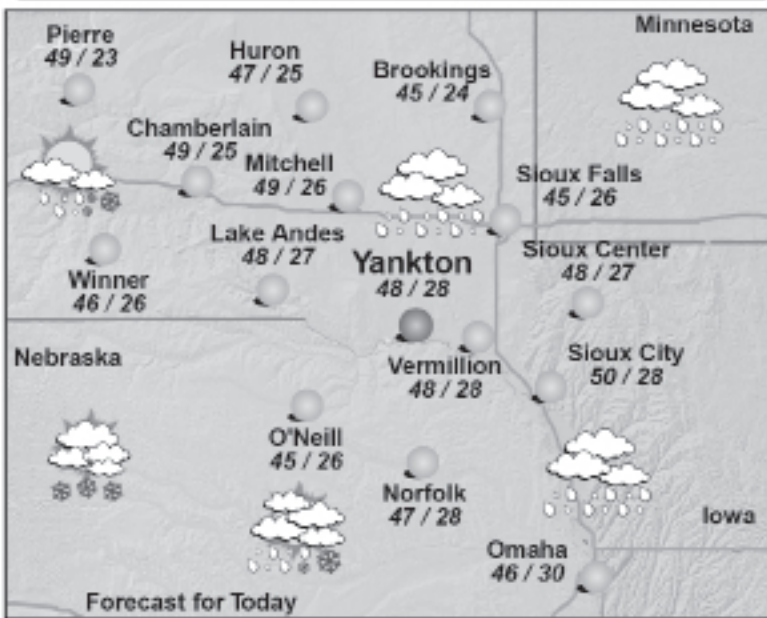

## BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain futures were mostly higher Tuesday on the Chicago Board of Trade. Wheat for December delivery fell 6.50 cents to \$4.8750 a bushel; December corn was up 2 cents to 3.62 a bushel; December oats gained 2.75 cents to 2.3775 a bushel; while January soybeans rose 4.50 cents to \$8.64 bushel. Beef and pork were higher on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. December live cattle was up .35 cent to \$1.2802 a pound; January feeder cattle rose 1.20 cents to \$16130 a pound; while December lean hogs advanced 2.37 cents to \$5.417 a pound.

## USDA Rural Development Celebrates Native American Heritage Month

LINCOLN, Neb. — USDA Rural Development celebrates Native American Heritage Month by recognizing partners that work together to meet the business and economic development needs of Native Americans residing in Nebraska.

Rural Development Native American earmark funding sources have provided financial assistance to tribes, villages, non-profits and community colleges.

Nebraska Native Americans have received technical assistance for food businesses and farmers' markets, help to gain organic certification and to purchase equipment for food preparation, processing and storage. Rural Development funds have provided education and training to main street businesses and Native American artists. Funds have been used for feasibility studies, strategic planning, tourism plans and marketing. Projects have included construction, renovation and equipment for business incubators and training facilities.

Recipients have used funding for downtown business revitalization planning, planning for industrial parks, business and community facility development.

Rural Development programs and funding opportunities are available in rural areas under 50,000 population. Native American earmark and non-earmark funding sources are available.
