Flat Lining: One-Third of 2015 Vehicles **Missing Spare Tire**

SIOUX FALLS - Automakers' decision to eliminate the spare tire may leave more than 30 million drivers vulnerable at the roadside, according to new research from AAA.

Tire inflator kits, a high-cost alternative, have replaced the spare tire in millions of vehicles over the last 10 model years and, due to their limited functionality, cannot provide even a temporary fix for many common tire-related problems. AAA calls on automakers to put consumer interests first and halt the elimination of the

fuel economy standards and the spare tire has become a casualty in an effort to reduce weight and boost milesper-gallon. The auto club believes advances in automotive engineering allow for weight to be reduced in ways that don't leave motorists

stranded at the roadside. AAA tested the most common tire inflator kits in today's vehicles and found that the units worked well in some scenarios, but they are not a substitute for a spare tire. For an inflator kit to work effectively, a tire must be punctured in the

Stuck Blend Door Means The Heat Is On

Dear Car Talk:

I have a 2008 Chrysler Town and Country with the 3.8-liter V-6 engine. I get heat when I want outside air or air conditioning. I have brought the car to Chrysler twice, and they say the system is working properly, and they properly charged me for telling me that both times. But I still get the heat. I looked for a valve that could be stuck open and be causing this, but I can see none in the system. I thought of putting one in, but then I saw that all the heater lines are actually metal, and integrating a valve would be difficult. There has to be something that segregates the hot from the cold and ambient air systems. I always enjoy your column, and hope you can help me. Thank you. - Jerry

Well, the first thing I'd do is when the dealer charges you for telling you that it's working properly, say, "No, actually, it's not." And then have him sit in the car so he can feel the heat.

My guess is that you have a blend door that not's closing. The dealer should have been able to figure that

out. In the majority of cars now, there's no heater control valve to stop the warm engine coolant from circulating

core behind your dashboard. If you have climate control in your car, you definitely don't have a heater control valve.

There are just flaps inside the ducts, called "blend doors," operated by vacuum motors, that open and close to allow heat or stop heat from coming through the vents into the passenger compartment. And it sounds like one of your blend door motors is no longer working and that door is stuck in the open position.

Unfortunately, if you really want to fix it, you'll probably have to take apart

the dashboard to get to it. Which makes it even more surprising that your dealer didn't home in on this: He can easily make a boat payment on this kind of repair.

So, at this point, I'd recommend that you try another dealer or an independent mechanic. There's a database of mechanics personally recommended by other readers and listeners of ours that you can search by ZIP code. You can find it at www.mechanicsfiles.com.

And if the price is too high for you, see if Costco is still selling that 128pack of Bermuda shorts. Best of luck.

Hospitals Pledge To Reduce Early Elective Deliveries

PIERRE – Less than a year after First Lady Linda Daugaard issued a challenge to hospitals throughout the state, all 24 birthing hospitals in South Dakota have pledged to help reduce early elective

eries performed before 39 weeks of pregnancy for non-medical reasons. EEDs can pose health risks to both mothers and babies. The American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists progress in reducing EEDs. According to the report, South Dakota and North Dakota were among only five states to reduce induction rates at 38 weeks of pregnancy by 30 percent or more.

"Flat tires are not a disappearing problem, but spare tires are," said John Nielsen, AAA's managing director of Automotive Engineering and Repair. "AAA responds to more than four million calls for flat tire assistance annually and, despite advances in vehicle technology, we have not seen a decline in tire-related calls over the last five years.

Ålong with run-flat tires, tire inflator kits have replaced spare tires on 29 million vehicles in the last 10 model years, steadily increasing from five percent of 2006 model year vehicles to more than one-in-three 2015 model year vehicles (36 percent) sold.

"Each four-pound kit eliminates about 30 pounds of weight, resulting in a small amount of savings in fuel consumption," said Marilyn Buskohl, spokeswoman for AAA South Dakota. "But the replacement cost is high. Some kits cost up to \$300 per use, so you can see where a tire inflator kit can cost up to 10 times more than a simple tire repair – and has a shelf life of only four to eight years.

AAA says automakers are facing increasingly-stringent

tread surface and the object must remain in the tire. Used correctly, the kit then coats the inner wall of the tire with a sealant and a compressor re-inflates the tire. If the puncture-causing object is no longer in the tire, if a sidewall is damaged or if a blowout occurs, a tire inflator kit cannot fix the flat and the vehicle have to be towed.

Knowing how to change a tire is a skill that is now less prevalent among younger age groups. More than one-in-five millennial drivers (ages 18-34) do not know how to change a tire, compared to the nearly 90 percent of drivers aged 35-54 who say they can change a flat. Gender differences also exist: while nearly all men (97 percent) claim to know how to change a tire, only 68 percent of women boast the same ability.

"Consumers may mistakenly believe that inflator kits are a one-size-fits-all alternative to installing a spare tire," said Buskohl. "The reality is these kits can only accommodate specific types of tire damage. Carrying a good old-fashioned spare tire can save stranded drivers time and money."

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recommends against induced labor or cesarean sections before 39 weeks of pregnancy unless there is a medical necessity.

Earlier this year First Lady Daugaard and North Dakota First Lady Betsy Dalrymple challenged birthing hospitals in the two states to sign a pledge to reduce non-essential early deliveries.

Mrs. Daugaard said 2014 data from the National Center for Health Statistics indicates that the Dakotas are making
