straight trip to the FCS playoffs. Additionally, this will be the Jacks' third consecutive first-round opponent out of the Big Sky Conference.

In 2013, SDSU defeated Northern Arizona, 26-7 and last year beat Montana State on the road, 47-40.

The winner this Saturday moves on for a second-round battle with, you guessed it, North Dakota State.

SDSU is one of five teams out of the Missouri Valley Football Conference selected Sunday to qualify for the FCS playoffs, the most of any conference. This is the second straight year the MVFC has had five teams in the playoffs.

SDSU's final regular season loss to Western Illinois ultimately decided its postseason fate. The Jacks, 8-3 overall, had hoped to host a first-round game at Howard Wood Field in Sioux Falls.

Instead Northern Iowa, 7-4, and ranked No. 15, got the nod to host a first-round matchup against Eastern Illinois. Northern Iowa won its final regular-season matchup against Southern Illinois and beat the Jacks 10-7 at recently demolished

South Dakota went without a first down on nine of its 13 drives. Junior fullback Drew Potter earned his first handoffs of the season and led the Coyotes with 76 yards rushing on 15 carries. Backup quarterback Brian Woodward, who rotated in and out with starter Ryan Saeger all game, ran 10 times for 44 yards. The Coyotes' best chance at a score was a dropped 32-yard touchdown pass in the end zone on the final play of the third quarter. Senior linebacker Keyen Lage led the Coyotes in tackles for the sixth time this season. His eight stops give him 249 during his four-year career, the fourth-most by a Coyote since 2000. Senior

defensive tackle Nick Jacobs got his fourth collegiate sack and had two other tackles.

**HUMBOLDT STATE 45, AUGUSTANTA 31:** ARCATA, Calif. – No. 11 Humboldt State racked up 707 yards of total offense and held No. 24 Augustana University to a season-low 279 yards of offense to defeat the fifth-seeded Vikings 45-31 in the first round of the NCAA Playoffs on Saturday. Augustana finishes the season 9-3, marking just its second season with nine or more wins in program history. The Vikings made their fifth NCAA Playoff appearance in program history and are now 1-4 all-time in NCAA postseason play. The Lumberjacks were led of-

Last year, two MVFC teams met for the championship in Frisco, Texas, with NDSU defeating Illinois State.

This won't be the first time the Jackrabbits will face Montana in the playoffs. Fans still remember the painful 2009 matchup in Missoula when SDSU surrendered five fourth-quarter touchdowns en route to a 61-48 loss in the school's first-ever appearance in the FCS playoffs. No. 1-ranked Montana went on to lose in the championship that year.

SDSU has an all-time record of 3-4 in the FCS playoff and will be appearing in its fifth postseason in the last seven years.

Stiegelmeier expects an intense atmosphere in Missoula.

The winner of this year's matchup will travel to Fargo on Dec. 5 to take on the No. 3-seed and four-time defending champion Bison.

Sully Buttes bounced back, taking the next two sets. Leading the fourth set 12-10, Parker pulled away for the most-lopsided set win of the match.

rabbits had a chance late in the game to put a positive spin on the trip. Running back Kyle Paris scored on a 2-yard run with 4 minutes, 28 seconds to play to tie the score at 17-all and force the overtime. That drive covered 75 yards in nine plays.

Then, SDSU had a chance to win the game in regulation after Je Ryan Butler intercepted a pass with 1:14 remaining. The Jacks moved to the Western Illinois 43-yard line, but quarterback Zach Lujan was intercepted on the final play of regulation.

That set up the overtime and a Western Illinois victory that pushed the Leathernecks' record to 6-5 overall, 5-3 in the MVFC. Truth be told, they're hoping to hear their name called during Sunday's playoff selection show.

“I said last week (an overtime win at Indiana State) that I don't know if I've ever been prouder of a football team,” said third-year Leathernecks coach Bob Nielson. “I'll have to recant that now, because I tell you what, I'm really proud of this group of guys. What a tremendous effort against a really good football team. South Dakota State is a really good football team, really well coached. They've got good players. There's a reason they beat Kansas and have the record they have and been to the playoffs the number of years in a row they have.”

Each team scored a touchdown on its first possession of overtime. Bruising running back Nikko Watson put

On the day, USF had 422 yards in total offense on 90 plays while limiting Henderson State to 282. However, HSU came up with three interceptions to turn back the Cougars. The USF total pushed their season total to 5665, the second best total in the DII era (5,798, 2014).

Two-time Harlon Hill nominee Luke Papillon had 67 yards rushing and a TD and threw for 279 yards with 32 completions on 51 attempts. He cracked 9K in total offense on his career, as he finished his junior campaign with a career mark of 9,142.

Western Illinois up 24-17 with a 1-yard run. But SDSU countered with an 8-yard scoring pass from Lujan to sophomore wideout Jake Wieneke to tie. Wieneke recorded a game-high nine receptions for 118 yards.

The Jackrabbits got the first possession of the second overtime but could not convert. Kicker Jay Carlson missed a 35-yard field goal try into the wind to give Western Illinois an opening they would not squander.

Helped by a pass interference penalty, the Leathernecks moved deep into SDSU territory and scored when McGuire rolled right and found the end zone seven yards later. McGuire finished the game with 19 completions on 40 attempts for 282 yards.

Watson added 178 rushing yards and a touchdown for Western Illinois, which beat a top-five, nationally ranked team for the first time since 2003 and secured its first winning season since 2010.

For SDSU, Lujan finished 21 of 37 passing for 246 yards. But he also threw three interceptions.

Jackrabbits running back Brady Mengarelli finished with a career-high 187 yards rushing on 20 carries. He added three receptions for 36 yards.

Defensively, SDSU was led by senior linebacker T.J. Lally, who had 17 tackles. Linebacker Jesse Bobbit added 11 stops for the Jacks.

So now both teams wait. The pairings for the FCS playoffs will be announced at 10 a.m. Sunday on ESPN. It will be a more suspenseful show than the Jackrabbits had been hoping for.
