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VERMILLION — On a November day in 2011, Joe Glenn welcomed two University of South Dakota athletic department officials into his Arizona home.

Shortly after playing the fight song for thenathletic director David Sayler and his associate, David Herbster, the conversation got real. USD wanted Glenn to come back to coach the Coyotes.

Eventually, the veteran coach — who had three national championship rings and 188 career wins - said yes.

"The chance to come home; to come back here and coach the Coyotes is a dream that I've had for a long time," Glenn told a packed ballroom during a Monday morning press conference in Vermillion.

"I just hoped I was young enough to give it what it needed.'

Four years later, that same internal compass told the 66-year-old Glenn that it was time to go. And that's exactly what Glenn officially announced Monday: He was stepping aside.

"But I knew when it was time to leave, too," Glenn said.

The USD Hall of Fame inductee, who won a pair of national titles at Northern Colorado

VERMILLION - Wes Beschorner is back in familiar territory.

The former University of South Dakota record-setting quarterback and current assistant coach is thrust into another transition period between head coaches.

The natural question out of Monday's retirement press conference for coach Joe Glenn was, what's next for the Coyotes? Who takes the reins now?

"I want the new coach to be me," Beschorner said after the press conference, matter-offactly. "That's it. That's really what I want it to be.'

The 33-year-old Lohrville, Iowa, native said the same things four years ago when he was USD's interim coach in the two weeks before Glenn was hired — as Glenn admitted again Monday, he had initially advocated for Beschorner to get the job.

"Jarett is a three-year starter for our program," said Harding County coach Jay Wammen. "He has extremely soft hands and catches anything in his direction. He is also one of our best run blockers

Guard: Brady Wieker, Langford Area. This four-year starter played a key role in the Lions' run to the state championship as Langford racked up more than 4,000 yards rushing as a team. "Brady was a devastating force for us on both sides of the ball," said Langford Area coach Paul Raasch, "He moves well for his size and is quick off the ball. His strength separates him from most guys he faced. He was our emotional leader, too.

Frost helped pave the way for the Cardinals potent running attack this season. The four-year starter was a key reason why DRSM rushed for 2,979 yards and averaged 331 yards rushing per game. "Jacob was as dominating of a guard as we've had," said Dell Rapids St. Mary coach Ross Flemmer. "He was who we ran
