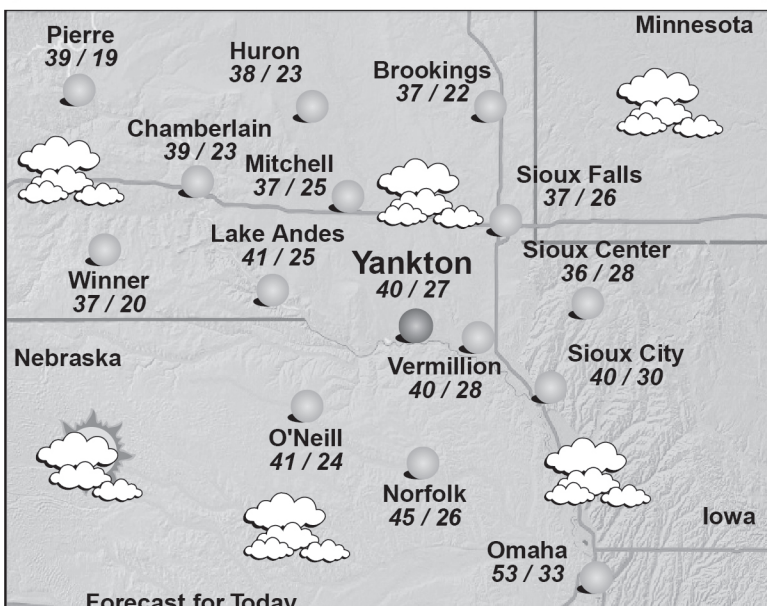

Fire Marshal Warns Of Home Fire Risk During Holidays

PIERRE — South Dakota Fire Marshal Paul Merriman wants South Dakotans to celebrate the upcoming holidays, but also realize the season means an additional fire risk.

Thursday's Thanksgiving Day starts the month-long holiday season. That means the installation of lights, trees, candles and other decorations, both inside and outside of homes.

Merriman says each one of those holiday trappings carries a potential fire risk.

"We all enjoy the trees, candles and lights," Merriman says. "But if not handled properly, they can be a fire hazard. We want everyone to have a joyous holiday season, but not one ruined by a home fire."

More cooking during the holidays also leads to an increased fire risk in the kitchen. The National Fire Prevention Association says 40 percent of home fires start in the kitchen. The leading cause of kitchen fires is unattended cooking.

The potential for a cooking fire can be reduced by:

- Wearing clothing with tight-fitting sleeves when cooking;
- Keeping potholders, oven mitts, wooden utensils, paper and plastic bags, towels and anything else that can burn, away from the stovetop;
- Turning off burners before leaving the kitchen; and
- Cleaning up food and grease from burners and stovetops.

One important way to guard against fires is to have working smoke alarms on each level of the home. Merriman says two-thirds of home fire deaths result from fires in homes with no smoke alarms or working smoke alarms.

"Smoke alarms that are properly installed and maintained can play a vital role in reducing fire deaths and injuries," Merriman says. "That is true all of the time; but especially so during the holidays when there is a greater potential for fires."

The South Dakota Fire Marshal's Office is part of the South Dakota Department of Public Safety.

ST. LOUIS — AAA South Dakota is offering a free alternative to climbing behind the wheel after drinking and running the risk of being charged with DUI. The auto club's Tippy Tow service will give you, a friend and your vehicle a free ride home, no questions asked.

"Our aim is simply to cut down the number of alcohol-related crashes in South Dakota," said Marilyn Buskohl, spokeswoman for AAA South Dakota. "Last year in the state, there were 583 injuries in alcohol-related accidents. These crashes resulted in 47 fatalities. South Dakotans continue to pay a terrible price when motorists decide to drink and drive."

Tippy Tows are available in Sioux Falls, Rapid City, Yankton and Mitchell starting this Wednesday, Nov. 25 at 6 p.m. until 2 a.m. Monday, Nov. 30. AAA will give you, one more person and your car a free ride within a 15-mile radius from point of pickup but only to one destination: home. Tippy Tow is free to everyone, AAA members and nonmembers alike. To access Tippy Tow, call 800-AAA-HELP (222-4357) and say, "I need a Tippy Tow."

Choosing designated drivers, using taxis, serving zero-proof mocktails at holiday parties, and calling for Tippy Tows are all great ways to avoid a DUI.

Illegally Dumped Snow Causing Problems

PIERRE — The South Dakota Department of Transportation reminds the public and commercial snow removal operators that it is illegal to place or dump excess snow on highway right of way, which includes driving surfaces, shoulders and ditches.

"The recent snowstorm across South Dakota has deposited a large amount of snow already this year and we are seeing an increase in violators," said Rod Gall, Yankton area engineer. "The space within the right of way needs to be reserved for future snow that may fall on the road. If the department's plow operators do not have a place to put that snow, it severely hampers their ability to clear roadways."

Violation of the anti-dumping law is a Class 1 misdemeanor, with a penalty of up to one year in jail, \$2,000 in fines, or both. It is the policy of the SDDOT to remove snow that has been illegally piled within the highway right of way that may be a safety hazard. In addition, violators will be billed for the costs of removing illegally dumped snow.

"Piling snow in the state highway right of way can also be very dangerous," says Gall. "Snow piles can restrict sight distance, as well as present an extreme hazard if a vehicle leaves the roadway. Snow piles that remain adjacent to the road may cause additional drifting and visibility problems posing more safety hazards to travelers, as well as additional expenses for manpower and equipment to remove the illegally dumped snow."

Property owners and access users are reminded it is their responsibility to remove snow from the ends of driveways and around their own mailboxes.
