City Gets Grant To Renovate **Riverside Park Play Area**

Yankton's Riverside Park Boundless Play Area project was recently approved for a \$10,000 Kickstarter grant

from the Wellness Foundation. This project will consist of removing the current outdoor playground equipment and placing new ADAaccessible play equipment and rubber fall material. The city's goal is to increase the use of the Riverside Park by children and adults with disabilities

and special needs. This Kickstarter grant will add to the city's \$40,000 National Park Service's Land and Water Conservation Fund and the \$150,000 the city has budgeted in 2017 for the project. The \$200,000 will be used toward the purchasing of new equipment and playground surfacing. Yankton's Parks & Recreation Direc-

tor Todd Larson was happy to receive the news about the Riverside Park Boundless Play Area being one of the projects chosen.

That was great to know," he said. "From the information we shared through e-mails and on Facebook, we knew the word was getting out. We had a lot of comments on posts and e-mails, so we knew there was a lot of positive buzz about the project."

Yankton's project was announced as a grant winner earlier this month, along with 54 other projects across South Dakota and Iowa. These projects are to encourage community access to healthier habits.

Wellness Foundation manager Stephanie Perry knew that Yankton's project would help achieve that goal.

We know that city budgets are tight, and our goal with this new grant program was to fund projects that are important for the overall health of the community that might not otherwise

be funded," she said. "The Boundless Play area at Yankton's Riverside Park interested us because it focuses on children of all abilities. Just because a child has a disability shouldn't mean they can't have access to a play-

The foundation took into account community need, the overall reach of people it would benefit and the immediate impact of funds being awarded.

Online voting was also a component of the grant review process. More than 57,000 votes were received during the two-week voting period at the end of September.

"It was clear from online voting and the number of submissions that the communities are very passionate about their projects' impact they will have now and for future genera-tions," Perry said. "These grants will empower the communities to improve upon the health and well-being of their communities for years to come.'

The construction is set to begin once the 2016 Riverboat Days Festival has concluded. The city would begin the process of removing the current equipment and the sand fall material. There are also timbers, benches and garbage cans that the department will be removing and replacing.

Plans for the equipment and fall material have yet to be decided. That would determine what the city will purchase with the grant money and specifics on area digging to put new material underneath the equipment.

There could be a concrete surface with rubber matting over the top. It could be rubber tiles over the top or we are starting to look into the option of artificial turf," Larson said. "We are looking at different options and what would be cost effective, with the idea that anyone with mobility issues should be able to use that playground surfacing.'

The next steps of the project will be spent working with the city's purchasing cooperatives, which is an arrangement to get lower prices from selected suppliers. It is often used by government agencies to reduce costs of procuring materials. Since governmental entities are required to follow laws regarding competitive bidding above certain thresholds, they can sign an agreement that allows them to legally use a contract that was procured by another governmental entity.

"We are able to go in, get a design for a space that we can give them and, knowing what we can spend, figure out the equipment and fall material through these buying cooperatives, Larson said. "We don't have to do a bid process."

Theses cooperatives will decide what playground equipment companies to review and ultimately finalize what the city will install. The new plan is set to be bigger than the space occupied by the current equipment, Larson said.

Depending on the particular playground equipment manufacturing company, the city will schedule one of its full-time employees for a supervised installation.

"That way, we have one of their employees help identify exactly what parts we are looking for, what things should go together first, problem shoot and help us that way," Larson

Larson plans to order the equipment in November or December 2016, with delivery and payment being in January 2017. The department wants to have the equipment here as soon as weather starts to break in order to start the installation, Larson said.




