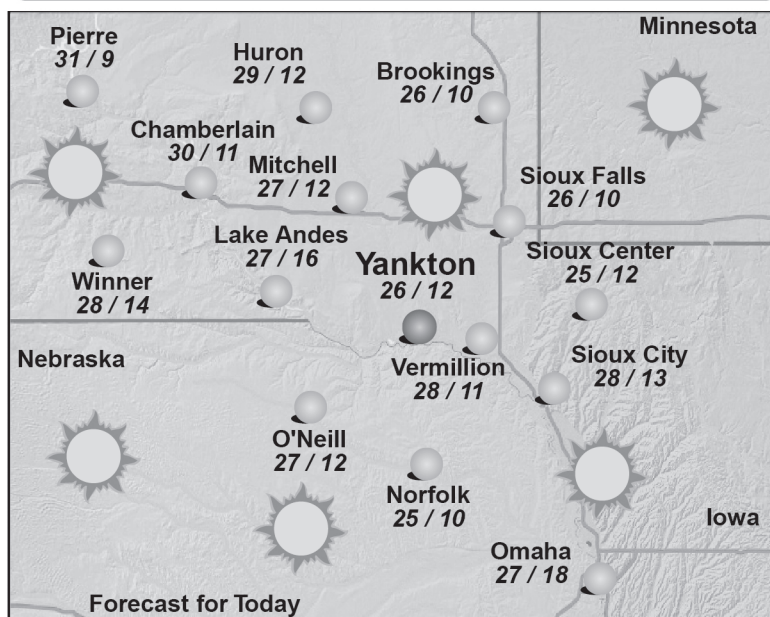

A stunning Fontanini Bethlehem Village consisting of more than 400 pieces will be on display beginning Nov. 30 through the Advent season. The village can be viewed in the MMC Boardroom, located in the Scholastica Learning Center (SLC). As the Onward Yankton committee develops a plan for Yankton's Big Idea, they are asking for community input about our downtown. Fokken's plan to make Yankton the Missouri River Capital of Entrepreneurship calls for establishing a creative downtown district, a focus on start-ups as well as small business, creative and affordable business space and strong partnerships with local schools and colleges.
