Mount Marty College has announced that the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE) has granted Mount Marty College full accreditation of the college's Master's level nursing degree program and post-Master's certificate program. CREIGHTON, Neb. — The Creighton Community Radio station, KNIL-95.9 FMLP, went live in February of this year. But when Rev. Jeff Lorig first talked to his parish family of St. Ludger Catholic Church in Creighton about starting a local radio station, they thought he was crazy.

"We were talking about building community but some of the parishioners thought it was a crazy idea," Lorig said. "Now they kind of like it and some have even said they might have to eat their

The local radio station was made possible by the Local Community Radio Act, cosponsored by Nebraska Congressman Lee Terry, passed in 2010 by Congress and signed into law by President Barack Obama in 2011. There was a very small window of opportunity to make an application for a community radio station which has now passed. Today there are 800 LP stations on the air across the country.

The planning began with discussion about how the station would be run. The more the parish talked, the more support it got. They decided to try it. The goal of the law was to create local programming for the benefit of the community and be nonprofit so Lorig said it was agreed it would not be about the parish but for the community. They applied for a construction permit from the FCC in October of 2013 during that small window of opportunity. When the application was approved, they started raising

The fundraising would be community-based and not be St. Ludger's parish money. It started with a raffle and there

were donations including a donation from the Creighton Community Foundation. The station needed about \$20,000 to get it up and running. Low power radio stations or LP in the call number means it is operated on low electrical power so it does not need a tower. The station is located in the St. Ludger Catholic School and is operated by a staff of 16 community volun-

teers.
"The station really uses the Internet in as many ways as possible," Lorig said. "That and electricity was what we needed to go live." Other expenses included paying for a music license. The station is live 24-7

and plays rock and roll music the majority of the day and after midnight they switch to inspirational talks with a Christian radio station. They started slow with a couple live programs which have proven to be very popular in the community. On Tuesday, there is a community morning show from 6:30-8 a.m. which broadcasts a community schedule, weather and also a live interview with someone from the community. On Wednesday mornings from 9-10 a.m., two teachers host a Hump Day show with the help of fifth and sixth grade students. The program offers lots of wacky information, trivia and takes call-ins. A spin off of that program started last week as three six grade girls became interested in having a show of their own which invites listeners to identify movie clips for a half-

hour on Monday after school. "I love their enthusiasm

and am excited to see their confidence and speaking skills grow," Lorig said.

Over the summer months the radio station offered a couple of internships to high school students who were interesting in broadcasting to work at the station during the day. They worked on public service announcements (PSAs) and learned their way around the equipment. A popular event initiated by the interns was the broadcast of the live play-by-play for four baseball games this summer.

The Creighton High School AD Randy Kliment gives reports which are aired throughout the week. This fall they have broadcast four football games with the help of two volunteer announcers, Sheriff Don Henry and local resident, Kenny Meier.

Lorig said they never compete with the "big boys," regular radio stations when they are present for a broadcast, but the community enjoyed the sporting broadcasts.

Since KNIL is a non-profit organization, commercials are not permitted but the volunteers secure business underwriting. For a donation, a business or service in the Creighton area gets a 30-second spot. This allows the station to make some money to pay for expenses. Since it only has a range of 10 miles, it is truly a community

The best night of programming is on Thursday night when the Toe Tapper show airs at 7:15 p.m. with Lorig and Justin Meuret of Brunswick.

"Well, Father started

talking to me about things we could do and after much thought, I agreed," Meuret said. "The monster was born."

Meuret said they talk about everything and everyone and do not discriminate – all is fair game. According to the FCC rules they can't endorse political candidates so the two feel free to comment on all candidates.


"It's just two guys, back and forth; we have a lot of fun," Meuret said. "I'm pleasantly surprised to have positive feedback from the community.'

Occasionally one or the other is missing so the men take advantage of the technology and invite an old college roommate or brother to Skype in and join the unusual conservation. An upcoming chili feed in Creighton will raise funds for the station and Meuret said there always seems to be things which need updating. Recent fundraising brought in monies which enabled the station to have a live link online. Looking to the future, raising the bar of the station output to a full-powered FM signal with a tower would be an amazing and pleasing success for Meuret.

"The supporters picked the call sign for their station, KNIL, which is LINK spelled backward," Lorig said. "It really shows how the radio station is really connecting the community.

It is 95.9 FMLP on the dial in the Creighton area and can be listened to live online.
