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IRS: Plan Now To Use Health Flexible Spending Arrangements In 2016

WASHINGTON — The Internal Revenue Service reminds eligible employees that now is the time to begin planning to take full advantage of their employer's health flexible spending arrangement (FSA) during 2016.

FSAs provide employees a way to use tax-free dollars to pay medical expenses not covered by other health plans. Because eligible employees need to decide how much to contribute through payroll deductions before the plan year begins, many employers this fall are offering their employees the option to participate during the 2016 plan year.

Interested employees wishing to contribute during the new year must make this choice again for 2016, even if they contributed in 2015. Selfemployed individuals are not eligible.

An employee who chooses to participate can contribute up to \$2,550 during the 2016 plan year. Amounts contributed are not subject to federal income tax, Social Security tax or Medicare tax. If the plan allows, the employer may also contribute to an employee's FSA.

Throughout the year, employees can then use funds to pay qualified medical expenses not covered by their health plan, including co-pays, deductibles and a variety of medical products and services ranging from dental

of Yankton, passed away Thursday, November 26, and vision care to eyeglasses and hearing aids. Interested employees should check with their employer for details on eligible expenses and claim procedures.

Under the use or lose provision, participating employees often must incur eligible expenses by the end of the plan year, or forfeit any unspent amounts. But under a special rule, employers may, if they choose, offer participating employees more time through either the carryover option or the grace period option.

Under the carryover option, an employee can carry over up to \$500 of unused funds to the following plan year-for example, an employee with \$500 of unspent funds at the end of 2016 would still have those funds available to use in 2017. Under the grace period option, an employee has until $2\frac{1}{2}$ months after the end of the plan year to incur eligible expenses-for example, March 15, 2017, for a plan year ending on Dec. 31, 2016. Employers can offer either option, but not both, or none at all. Employers are not required

to offer FSAs. Accordingly, interested employees should check with their employer to see if they offer an FSA. More information about FSAs can be found in Publication 969, available on IRS.gov.

New Pastor Arrives In Yankton: "From The Grid Iron To Grace"

Mikal Simmons and his family — his wife, Sarah and three children, Ethney, Elim and Eviannah — have joined a new family at Yankton's First Assembly Church. As of Nov. 1, Simmons became First Assembly's co-pastor, to eventually transition to the lead pastor position. Mikal explains the title, "From the

Grid Iron to Grace": "I was successful on the football field, was injured in college, and I totally fell apart until I met the One (God) who put me back together.'

Simmons grew up in Brandon and was recently inducted into the Bandon Valley Hall of Fame. During his senior year of high school in 1995, he was an all-state running back and state champion in wrestling.

His high school success led to a football scholarship at South Dakota State University in Brookings.

"I lost my identity in the football lifestyle and partying. This led to depression, then suicide tendencies," he said. "I knew the way I wanted to live, but I didn't know how to achieve it. Then after I earned the starting tailback position, I blew out both my knees, ending my football career, causing deeper depression. I didn't know what to do. More importantly, I didn't know who I was.'

Though the loss of his identity in athletic success, Mikal was convinced that his future was dim, and, as a result, tried to end his life.

"I ended up in the hospital, need-ing major surgery that led to intense shame," Simmons recalls.

After a couple of years of depression, he found something new and his life began to change.

With what I had learned through sports about overcoming my opponent, I discovered that God's Word could overcome depression," he said.

Mikal attributes a personal relation-

ship with Jesus Christ and the impact of God's Word for the change in his life.

During a short-term mission trip to China with his wife. Simmons felt his direction in life was to be a pastor.

"I went from being a person who had a hard time getting out of bed, to one who loved life," he said.

This subsequently led Simmons to The King's University in Colorado where he graduated with a degree in Theology and Christian Ministry. Back in Brandon, Simmons was men-

tored by Pastor Kirk Stand, senior pastor of Brandon Valley Assembly of God. He confirmed that Simmons had the giftings to become a Senior Pastor, and encouraged him in that direction

"My wife and I would drive through Yankton a few times a year since her parents live in central Nebraska, and we would tell each other that Yankton would be a neat place to do ministry,' he said.

Last summer, Pastor Jeff Mantz from

Yankton First Assembly called Simmons and asked if he would be interested in co-pastoring with him.

"I had a peace and knew God was in

this," Simmons said. "I'm excited about the future and working together with Mikal, in this transitional period," Mantz says. "After almost 20 years of being senior pastor, I look forward to a different role in ministry

"We believe God has sent the man to take First Assembly to the next phase."

Simmons said, "My heart is to equip people to live their life on purpose and encourage them to be what God has called them to be."

He added that he desires to empower individuals to have a solid identity in Christ

Of First Assembly, Simmons said, "We will continue to offer an amazing Sunday morning experience, with something for every age and every stage in life." This is in reference to the children's program on Wednesdays and Sundays, youth programs on Wednesdays and the adult groups. "We don't only have church in the church."

Simmons said several members of First Assembly have opened their homes for life groups.

First Assembly is growing and has the youth of our city, as well as the community as a whole, in mind for the near future. Under the ministry of Pastor Annette Roux, there are current plans to build a student center that will house a full-size gym, theater-style worship center and coffee house. Neb. Transportation Improvement Plan Amendment Announced

LINCOLN, Neb. - The Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) and Federal Transit tation Improvement Program (STIP). The STIP must list all highway and transit projects that will be using federal funds, as well as all regionally significant transportation projects using non-federal funding sources. It covers a period of four years and in Nebraska is updated every year on Oct. 1.

Department of Roads (NDOR) must amend the STIP for reasons such as; to add or remove projects, to make adjustments to funding sources or estimates or to update a

An amendment, referred to as Amendment 1, is available for public comment on the NDOR website http://www.transportation. nebraska.gov/STIP/indexpublic-comment.html through Dec. 3, 2015.

The FHWA and the FTA will not approve the revision until the public comment period has ended and comments have been evaluated and incorporated in the revision as appropriate.
