

dedication and teamwork through the participation of extracurricular activities. So far, XQ has recruited the Gayville-Volin school district to participate in the project. "I thought it would be a cool thing to do because we need to change how the high school system is set up," said Climer. "It doesn't work for our generation." After explaining the competition to the class of 12, the students were eager to participate. The class is divided into teams to focus on different aspects of the education model. MMC junior Shanna Ibarolle is part of the team collecting data. "Data is about what employers are looking for in students coming out of college and what instructors are looking for their students to have coming into college," she explained. Most of the data collected focuses on students in grades 8-12, especially seniors who can tell what their four years of high school were like and what they wanted to have happened differently. MMC student Michael Freeman is also looking into research, which involves viewing other schools' education designs. "Oregon has done tests that show No Child Left Behind has done nothing to improve schools," he said.

"There are some new concepts we're coming up with and that we're planning on implementing in this school design." They are also borrowing old methods used in the past that worked well within the school system but were replaced by No Child Left Behind, according to Freeman. "Some of those ideas were taken away because schools had to concentrate on other subjects," he said. "But what happened was, a lot of creativity was taken away from the kids." In Climer's experience, it is evident that a majority of high school graduates aren't ready for college. "Seeing freshmen come in after they've done assessments and constant testing, it's clear they're not prepared," she said. "Some of their writing is atrocious because the focus is on memorizing. They're not applying anything." However, colleges aren't the only option for students after graduation. "Tech schools in the U.S. are thriving," Ibarolle said. "I think it's because, instead of taking two years of generals, they are able to jump in and get hands-on into what they're interested in. If we can allow high school students to find those areas they're passionate about, they can have a better idea of what they want to pursue and what kind of member of society they'll be once they graduate." There is also stress and pressure on the teachers who have certain guidelines to follow in educating the

students. "They (teachers) have all these standards and assessments to meet," explained Climer. "They can't really teach. It's all about 'write this down, write this down.' It takes the fun out of teaching." The focus of the MMC team is on getting the students more involved in their education. "If we could implement this design, we would like to see kids take ownership of their education," said Ibarolle. "They'd still learn their core classes like English and math, but we also want them to have opportunities to take hold of areas that are of interest to them and pursue it in depth." This is where the community support comes in. "Our data so far shows that kids want the opportunity to be hands-on or pursue areas of interest so, when they graduate, they have a better idea of what to do afterwards," Ibarolle said. This can be accomplished by having businesses offer internships and/or work study hours so a student can decide if his or her chosen craft is the right direction for that person. "Sometimes kids go through school in a daze and suddenly, they're 35 years old saying, 'I'd really like to do this' but don't have the educational background," said Freeman. "We're hoping that with this concept, we can reach every child maxi-

mize their potential before they graduate." Climer referenced Ford Motors, which has a program that hires high school students as interns to explain the technology of the vehicles to customers. That type of experience is included in the team's model, which would help students get job experience and have a job reference to put in a resume. "There are so many students who don't know what's available to them because of how they grew up and where they grew up," said Ibarolle. "Providing that within the school system helps them become better contributors to society." This experience is beneficial to the future educators participating in the competition. "They're learning how school systems are run and the concepts that do and don't work," said Climer. "When they become teachers, they will be filled with that information and know what needs to happen. Hopefully, it will trickle down from there to the schools." going to have to put up 'road closed' signs up. It's not something we want to do, but when the money is not there — we can't fix the problem without funds. The people spoke back in September not to do the road and bridge levy." In September, a proposed levy to aid in repairs of county road and bridges filed with 70 percent of voters rejecting the idea. Yankton County Highway Superintendent Brian Gustad will also be on hand at both meetings. In addition to the special session on Tuesday, the commission's regular meeting will also discuss other outstanding road and bridge

issues and the formation of a road and bridge task force made up of commissioners and levy proponents and opponents. The task force's goal will be to find solutions for road and bridge funding that all sides can agree with. Additionally, Tuesday's meeting will also discuss proposals for a new county website, findings from the six county town hall meetings held in September, a shared route maintenance and reconstruction agreement with the City of Yankton, and the implementation of a consent agenda for plats, monthly reports and other routine business. The commission meets at 4 p.m. for its regular session Tuesday at the Yankton County Government Center in the commission chambers. Follow @RobNielsenPandD on Twitter.
