



the MNRR to concerns about access to and awareness of the national park.

Suggestions for the future included wildlife viewing stations, more outreach through media outlets and the Internet, utilizing volunteers to increase education efforts and tours of the river via boat.

The information gathered this week and during other interactions in the months ahead will be collected into a draft version of the interpretive plan, Doherty-Stephan said. In January, the National Park Service plans to hold public meetings during which that document can be reviewed and feedback can be offered.

She said it should be complete by next summer and put in binding. "When we talk about binding, we're not talking about in the traditional sense," Doherty-Stephan said. "It's going to be in a three-ring binder, so that we can add, change and adapt as we need to. There will also be periodic reviews. If people want to have an annual progress meeting, I'm up for that. I want the input, and to let people know that input didn't fall on deaf ears."

Steven Mietz, the National Park Service superintendent for the MNRR, said the document will form the foundation upon which park service staff seek out grant money to make ideas for the park's future come to fruition.

8 Feared Dead After Crash

KABUL, Afghanistan — A cargo plane contracted by a U.S.-based company crashed into mountains east of Afghanistan's capital Kabul, with initial reports saying all eight people aboard were killed, an Afghan airport official said.

The plane was flying from Bagram Air Field, the main U.S. military base in Afghanistan, when it went down east of the capital Tuesday at about 8 p.m. (1530 GMT), Kabul Airport Director Mohammad Yaqub Rassuli told The Associated Press.

An Associated Press photographer near the scene saw wreckage ablaze on a hillside. The cause of the crash wasn't immediately known. Weather conditions were clear Tuesday evening.

Rassuli said all eight crew members were believed dead, although NATO and Afghan troops were continuing with their search-and-rescue mission.

"We're still hoping to find survivors," NATO spokesman James Judge said. "We're still searching."

The aircraft took off from Bagram, which lies about 30 miles (50 kilometers) north of Kabul, but its destination was unclear.

The plane owned by United Arab Emirates-based TransAfrik was under contract by the U.S.-based company National Air Cargo, Judge said.

"The company has confirmed that a TransAfrik L-100 aircraft flying from Bagram to Kabul went down shortly before 8:00 p.m.," National Air Cargo said in a statement. "There were eight personnel onboard including one National employee. The status of the personnel on board and cause of the crash are unknown at this time. Our thoughts and prayers go out to the crew and their families."

NATO said in a statement that the crash occurred about 16 miles (30 kilometers) east of the Kabul International Airport.

In May, a passenger plane operated by Pamir Airways, a private Afghan airline, crashed while traveling from Kunduz in northern Afghanistan to the capital. All 44 passengers on the plane died.

an extensive period, inundating southern Charles Mix County with an estimated 13 inches of rainfall in an 80-hour period. Charles Mix County authorities placed an estimated \$1 million price tag on flood-related damage, and Yankton Sioux officials found a similar amount of damage.

Faced with the loss of its tribal headquarters in the aftermath of flooding, the Yankton Sioux Tribe has used temporary office space at the Marty Indian School. The school's campus also suffered extensive flood damage.

"We were displaced," Archambeau said. "It cost us \$27,000 to rewire, re-carpet and re-do the windows (at the school)."

The tribe continues using office space on the second and third floors of the school's administrative building, Archambeau said.

However, she welcomes the move to a new tribal headquarters, even if temporary. "The school building is for our children. We (tribal officials) don't like being there and bargaining in there," she said. "It's not appropriate for us to be there. We need to be somewhere else."

Besides the damage to the tribal hall and Marty Indian School, 63 tribal families in Marty were also displaced in the flood which destroyed homes and buildings.

Of the 12,246 tribal members, about one-third live on the reservation, according to the Shakopee news release. Immediately following the flood, the Shakopee donated \$100,000 for relief efforts directed at the needs of affected families. This was in addition to the \$1 million grant the YST received from the Shakopee in fiscal year 2010.

Part of the \$1 million Shakopee grant will be used to build a new football field at Marty. The Braves hadn't played a game in Marty for 25 years. In recent years, the squad held its "home" games at Andes Central High School in neighboring Lake Andes.

That changed this year, when the Marty football team hosted its first home games in a quarter-century, Archambeau said. The makeshift field doesn't have lights, so games are held during the afternoon.

"We hadn't played on our home turf for 25 years. We needed our own football field, so we got it cleaned up and fixed up nice with goal posts," she said. "The kids loved it. The team didn't win, but they got some self-esteem."

Last Friday, the Marty team celebrated a true "homecoming" game, and this season has seen tailgating, Archambeau said. "We cooked barbecue chicken on the grill, and we had brats, hot dogs and hamburgers," she said. "We fed 300 people."

Marty officials haven't decided whether, in using the Shakopee grant, to keep the newly-renovated football field on the same site or choose a new location, Archambeau said.

"We are also talking about putting a track and field there, along with the football field," she said. The Shakopee grant is just the latest donation received by the reservation since the June flooding, Archambeau said. The latest donations include 220 coats, as tribal members prepare for the change of seasons.

Wagner grocer R.F. Buche also sponsored a meal last weekend for local residents, Archambeau said. "Buche put on a big dinner party at Marty, in the community building, for all the flood victims," she said. "He was showing a definite act of kindness for others. I really respect him for that."
