Corps of Engineers will hold a public hearing on its Annual Operating Plan (AOP) for the Missouri River dams. The Corps hearing, one of six held around the river basin, is set for 7 p.m. Wednesday, also at the Marina Inn.

The Corps draft plan anticipates serving all of the authorized project purposes. Those purposes include flood control, navigation, hydropower, water supply and water quality control, irrigation, recreation and fish and wildlife, including threatened and endangered species.

At Wednesday night's hearing, the Corps will give an update on its Missouri River releases and uses of the river, Lepisto said.

The six mainstem power plants generated 1,094 million kilowatt hours (kWh) of electricity in September, enough to power more than 93,000 homes for a year. Power plant generation for the month of September was 123 percent of normal. Total energy production for 2010 is forecast to reach 9 billion kWh.

The long-term average is approximately 10 billion kWh.

In a news release, the Corps said it anticipates above-normal runoff in the Missouri River basin during October. Corps officials say the increased releases from the Gavins Point and Fort

Randall reservoirs at Yankton and Pickstown, respectively, will allow the Corps to meet all authorized purposes in 2011.

The Corps increased the Gavins Point Dam releases from 46,500 cubic feet per second (cfs) to 49,000 cfs in early October and will maintain those releases through Dec. 1 to prepare for next year's run-off season.

"We expect to have the majority of the stored flood waters evacuated from the system by early December," said Jody Farhat, Chief of the Water Management office in Omaha, Neb. "The higher releases this fall will cause water levels to be about 3 to 4 feet higher than normal, but the releases will remain within the river channel unless we experience a significant amount of precipitation. We will begin ramping down releases from Gavins in early December."

The forecast for October shows a continued greater-than-normal runoff season. The runoff pattern should start to return to more normal conditions later this month. The current forecast for runoff this season is 38.7 million acre feet, 156 percent of average.

The scheduling of the MRRIC

and Corps events together is no coincidence, Lepisto said.

"Many of the same people who attend the MRRIC conference would also attend the AOP hearing, so the Corps scheduled it for the same time and location," he said. "Most people wouldn't make separate trips for the two events, so this way they are killing two birds with one stone."

Lepisto emphasized he doesn't speak on behalf of MRRIC. However, he noted a number of issues — particularly the sediment and habitat sessions — hit home for the Missouri National Recreational River (MNR).

The MNR consists of two stretches of the Missouri River, comprising 98 river miles, that are protected in northeast Nebraska and southeast South Dakota. The area includes a 59-mile section from Gavins Point Dam near Yankton to Ponca, Nebraska, and a 39-mile section from Fort Randall Dam near Pickstown to Lewis and Clark Lake.

The MRRIC presentation dealing with sediment begins at 1 p.m. Wednesday, Lepisto said.

"They will give an update on the National Research Council's sedimentation study of the Missouri River," he said. "This is a system-wide study for the entire river, but it will include sediment build-up on Lewis and Clark Lake and also the lack of sediment below Gavins Point Dam."

The sediment session will be

followed by a 2:30 p.m. presentation on sandbar construction for the interior least tern and the piping plover, two species of birds on the Federal Endangered Species List.

The Corps' Missouri River Recovery Program plans to construct three emergent sandbar habitat (ESH) complexes totaling up to 75 acres in the Missouri River. The complexes will be located at River mile 757; River mile 759, roughly four miles upstream of Ponca State Park; and River mile 789.6 near Wynot, Neb.

All work is scheduled for completion by April 15, 2011, the date typically associated with the birds' arrival back on the Missouri River in the spring.

This year, the sandbar construction will use a new method that will take advantage of the expected high releases out of Gavins Point Dam this fall. The Corps intends to use large sand-filled tubes called geotubes to slow down the water. In turn, the process will cause sand to deposit and form sandbars immediately downstream of the structures. The tubes will be filled with sand from the bed of the river adjacent to the site.

The geotubes offer a departure from traditional construction methods, which excavate sand with hydraulic dredges or excavators and pile the sand to form sandbars.

The Corps plans to construct sandbars both above and below Gavins Point Dam, Lepisto said.

## Flooded Farm Land Applications Due Nov. 1

Landowners who qualify for a reduction in assessed value on their flooded crop land must turn the needed paperwork in to their local assessor's office (Director of Equalization) by Nov. 1, 2010.

Land that can't be planted because it is flooded may be eligible for a reduction in assessed value. Applications must be submitted each year accompanied by current Farm Service Agency maps with flooded acres clearly marked. The paperwork must be dropped off at the Director of Equalization Office or post-marked by Nov. 1.

Lakes, dugouts and land in the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) are not eligible.

Flooded farm land applications are available at the Director of Equalization Office, in Yankton County, that office is in the County Government Center, 121 West Third Street, Yankton.
