ference is," he said. "I don't think there's any sadness there. There were some great rivalries in the Big 12, but I think we're all excited about the new challenges ahead."

Ultimately, the move to the Big Ten was the right thing to do for the future of the program, Jones said.

"With revenue from the Big Ten Network and with the academics, I think it was a great move overall," he said. "I think the powers that be wouldn't have made the move if they didn't think it was beneficial for us. I think it's a great move for us, and we're all excited to get going."

In Yankton, fans watched the Huskers' nationally televised first Big Ten game Saturday night at various locations across town.

Charlie Ausdemore, who was visiting from Lincoln and caught the game at Ben's Brewing Co., said he was pleased to see Nebraska finally play in its new conference.

"It's better than being in the Big 12," he said. "We don't have to worry about those refs any more."

While he was happy with the move, the life-long Husker fan said he would miss the team's historic rivalries.

"It's too bad they don't get to play the (original) Big 8 teams anymore," said Ausdemore, who has caught every Nebraska football game either on television or the radio since 1993.

Ausdemore said he has worked on making the transition to being a fan of the Big Ten, even though it hasn't been easy.

"I listen to all the Big Ten games now," he said. "But it's hard to get used to because you don't know the names of the players and stuff."

While many believe the conference jump to be significant, the names of the opponents aren't important to everyone.

"It doesn't matter what team we're playing," said Tyler Meis of Yankton, who also watched the game at Ben's. "We just love watching Husker football."

Viaduct Prompted By 3 Deaths To Open Today

HICKMAN, Neb. (AP) — A viaduct to carry pedestrians and vehicles over railroad tracks south of Hickman will open Monday.

The Lincoln Journal Star reports a dedication was held Saturday for the \$5 million project, which was prompted by the deaths of three teens in 1986. A vehicle carrying the trio was struck by a train in thick fog.

The 3,000-foot-wide viaduct will take traffic over the tracks. A walkway on the west side will accommodate pedestrians and bicyclists.

The project had caused 14 months of detours in the area but was completed three weeks ahead of schedule.

Iowa Mail Processing Center Closes

SIoux CITY, Iowa (AP) — The Sioux City mail processing center has closed despite attempts to save it.

KITV-TV reports that the final pieces of mail went through the center on Saturday morning. Operations are being transferred to a processing center in Sioux Falls.

The postal service announced the consolidation decision in June as part of its plan to cut its staggering losses. Iowa's congressional delegation and others tried to fight the closure.

Postal officials have said local mail delivery will not be affected by the move. However, Sioux City will lose about 70 jobs.
