Raschke said people have to be more cognizant of what effect their actions have downstream.
"I've had people tell me to just put a culvert in every east-west road up (in the northern part of the state) and 'We'll get the water to the Jim River and then we don't care,'" he stated. "I tell them that the guy in Yankton and Hutchinson counties might care. To me, that's moving the water faster than the natural flow would."
Also Tuesday, the commission agreed to apply for \$343,000 in federal aid for riprapping both sides of 431st Avenue to withstand future James River flooding. The county will have to supply 20 percent in matching funds.
Commission Chairman Bruce Jensen said he feels the chances of the county receiving the funding are good.
In the meantime, Commissioner Garry Moore suggested that some work be done on the most vulnerable portion of the roadway this fall.
"I still think we need to go in and put down some fabric at that north end on the east side for 200-300 yards," he said. "We need to get some rock in there and try to keep that road from washing out again."
The rest of the commission supported Moore's plan but said costs would have to be determined before any solid plans are made. Jensen, Moore and county Highway Superintendent Alan Sorensen will go out next week to get a precise measurement of the piece being discussed so bids can be obtained.
Jody Kludt, a resident in the area where the flooding occurs, asked that the commission investigate the installation of culverts under the road on the north end.
"If you can put a culvert there and the rocks around it, you would think that would help (reduce the flooding faster)," she said.
Commissioner Mark Johnson disagreed, echoing an exchange Jody and he had last week on the matter.
"You're not going to see the water drop appreciably from a culvert," he said. "In order to make an impact like you want to see, you're talking a battery of culverts running under that entire road, which is totally not feasible. In order to do that, you'd have to raise the road, as well."
That would mean raising the bridge on the south end, he added.
Though at least some on the commission were skeptical about the usefulness of culverts, it was agreed that Ron Peterson, the Yankton-area engineer for the South Dakota Department of Transportation, would be asked to give his opinion on the matter in the next week.

BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures fell Tuesday on the Chicago Board of Trade.
Wheat for December delivery fell 15.50 cents to \$6.04 a bushel; December corn fell 4.75 cents to \$5.8775 a bushel; December oats dropped 3.50 cents to \$3.2450 a bushel; while November soybeans fell 17.50 cents to \$11.60 a bushel.
Beef futures and pork futures traded mixed on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.
December live cattle fell 1.77 cent to \$1.2155 a pound; November feeder cattle fell 1.95 cent to \$1.4090 a pound; and December lean hogs rose 0.05 cent to 86.85 cents a pound.

Hillary Rodham Clinton's 2008 presidential campaign.
One email, from Marja Verloop, an official at the U.S. Embassy in Ottawa, cheered news from Elliott that Sen. Max Baucus, D-Mont., was supporting the pipeline.
"Go Paul! Baucus support holds clout," Verloop wrote.
In an e-mail to David Jacobson, the U.S. ambassador to Canada, Verloop described TransCanada as "comfortable and on board" with developments in the review process.
Terry Cunha, a spokesman for TransCanada, said Elliott lobbied State Department officials in much the same way as lobbyists for Friends of the Earth and other environmental groups.
"Mr. Elliott was and is simply doing his job," Cunha said. "No laws have been broken"
Cunha called it "absurd" to suggest that Elliott or Verloop — described by the State Department as a career Foreign Service officer — could determine the outcome of a review that involved 10 federal agencies and a "myriad" of local governments. The three-year U.S. review included detailed environmental assessments by the State Department and Environmental Protection Agency, and a series of public hearings.
Victoria Nuland, a State Department spokeswoman, said Verloop, a counselor for energy/environment at the U.S. Embassy, did not "have any impact or any input in the development of the Keystone environmental impact statement" released by the State Department in August.
Nuland said officials were reviewing emails from Verloop and other officials regarding the Keystone project, adding that she was confident the review "is going to show broad engagement with the government of Canada, with industry, with (non-governmental organizations), with the environmental community, with public interest advocates on all sides of this issue."
The State Department has authority over the \$7 billion project because the pipeline would cross the U.S. border. Officials have promised a decision by the end of the year.
Public hearings on the project were held in each of the affected states last week, drawing large crowds for and against the pipeline. A final hearing is scheduled Friday in Washington.
