won't be available in a week or two," he said. "We are looking at water quality, sediment and the high water mark. We will make sure that we share widely our data so that others don't spend for the same information gath-

The post-flood work includes a water management review and assessment, the flood fight response and infrastructure damage assessment. The work also includes repair and restoration of the system with a list of work needed by next spring.

"We are trying to establish priorities and funding. But the Corps is project funded, and it affects us if our budget is cut back," he said.

The Corps will also find itself in intense competition for contractors as local, tribal, state and federal governments seek massive repair work at the same time, the commander said.

Ruch encouraged the public to attend the Annual Operating Plan (AOP) meetings, which include sessions Nov. 2 in Pierre and Nov. 3 in Sioux City. The AOP meetings will look at 2011-12 and feature an afternoon open house as well as the evening meetings, he

said.
"We were disappointed last year. We had only three outside people at one meeting," he said. "I challenge people everywhere to go. If you care how the basin is run, get some representatives to these meetings so we hear you. If you don't come, you don't get a voice.'

Ruch said he doesn't want to see a handful of officials control the dialogue. That's especially true with cutbacks in government funding, which in turn affects the ability to take on projects, he said.

"We would like to see the whole basin have a voice," he said. "We would like to see more of a public process."

Ruch said he was pleased to see the river basin's governors forming a task force, with the next meeting scheduled for Oct. 17 in Omaha.

"The governors are providing more of a say up and down the basin," the district commander said. During Tuesday's public com-

ments, MSAC board chairman Larry Weiss called for greater emphasis on the problems created by siltation.

'For the last 11 years, we have pushed the sediment issue and its impact," he said. "The sediment takes away the storage that we needed this

MSAC technical advisor Howard Paul noted that two-thirds of South Dakota is served by the Missouri River. Sedimentation is creating major havoc with the water supply, he said. "We have to keep the focus on

what is on top," he said. Yankton Sioux tribal official Dennis Rucker called for the Corps to meet with the tribe and gain greater input

on tribal needs.

In response to tribal concerns, the post-flood task force has sent an invi-

tation for input from each tribal chairman affected by flooding, Ruch said.

Rucker asked about Corps responsibility for erosion on tribal land, but Ruch said the Corps is limited in its ability to provide financial compensation for damages. The large number of natural disasters this year has also put a strain on federal disaster relief,

he said. "We don't want to lead you to believe there's a big pot of money out there," Ruch said.

Fort Randall project manager Tom Curran noted the floods' impact on river channels.

"At first, we didn't see much change. But when we went out Friday, there were new sandbars here, there and everywhere," he said. "Now, on the South Dakota side, there are deep channels. Holes that were 30 feet deep are now 70 feet deep."

After Tuesday's meeting, Weiss said he found a great deal of valuable ground was covered in the meeting

"Having a face-to-face meeting with the Corps is of value," Weiss said. "It provided us with the opportunity to know each other better and try to indicate what to work on cooperatively from the MSAC perspective.'

By working together, the government and agencies can share their information and resources, Weiss said.

"It's an outstanding event for determining the current situation and where we go in the future," he said. "Hopefully, it's an event that comes just once in our lifetimes.'

Yet while Republicans and Democrats appear to be pointing to a showdown that could reverberate into the 2012 election campaign, some elements of the measure could clear Congress with relative ease by year's end.

As an example, Republicans have not ruled out extending and expanding the payroll tax cuts that took effect on Jan. 1, at a cost of \$247 billion over a decade, the single costliest item in the Obama's legislation.

Democrats said Reid's proposed millionaires' surtax was designed to quell much if not all of the opposition from his own rank and file, a subject that Sen. Dick Durbin of Illinois, the second-ranking leader, referred to in an interview with reporters.

"We're also obviously going to work on the number of votes to support it. It may not be the exact plan offered by the resident, but I think he, when he presented it to us, said that we need to be open to some variations and modifications," Durbin said.

The payroll tax cut extension faces little if any opposition from Democrats, and Obama's request for more than \$100 billion in new spending as a

way of creating jobs is also popular. To pay for his \$477 billion plan, Obama has proposed higher taxes on family incomes over \$250,000 and on the oil and gas industry to finance the jobs bill.

The first request troubles Democratic senators from states like New York, New Jersey and California, where large numbers of families could be hit by the increase. The second has drawn opposition most prominently from Louisiana Sen. Mary Landrieu, whose state is home to numerous oil and gas operations.

The president also proposed higher taxes on hedge fund managers and corporate jet owners, and those increases, too, would disappear under the changes Reid is expected to unveil on Wednesday. Reid told reporters that Obama

was "not locked into anything" he had recommended to pay for the legislation, adding that he was in the process of making changes in them. His office declined comment on the emerging plan for a surcharge on millionaires, but several Democrats, speaking anonymously to discuss the

"House Republicans have different ideas on how to grow the economy and create jobs, but that shouldn't prevent us from trying to find areas of common ground with the president."

House Republicans have begun passing legislation to block or roll back administration regulations on several industries, saying their removal will create jobs.

While Republican lawmakers appear receptive to tax cuts the president has called for, they have expressed strong opposition to his proposed new spending.
