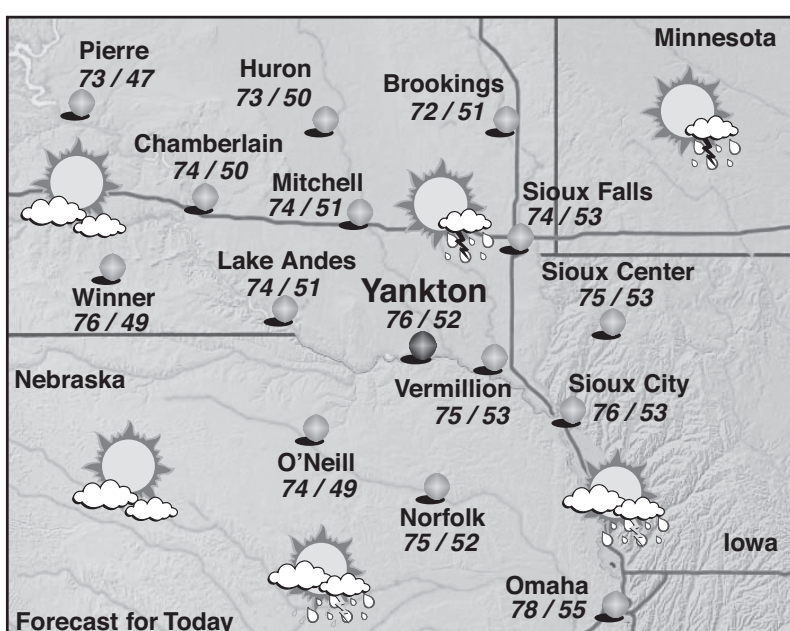

December live cattle fell 1.50 cent to \$1.2002 a pound; November feeder cattle rose 0.77 cent to \$1.4312 a pound; and December lean hogs fell 1.65 cent to 87.75 cents a pound.
