It's just one tool, but it's a very effective tool and very low cost." On big questions, such as satisfaction with Yankton as a place to live, respondents gave the community an "84" — up one point from last year but down one from 2009. Yankton as a place to raise children got an "82." The overall appearance of Yankton received a "75," and the overall quality of life in Yankton got a "78."

The overall quality of city services received a "75," which is down one point from 2010. The overall image of the city got a "76" — one point higher than the previous year. When asked about the overall value that they received for their city tax dollars and fees, respondents gave the municipality a "67," which has been consistent all three years of the survey.

Commissioner Jake Hoffner expressed concern about the response to a question about the taste and odor of city drinking water. The question elicited a response of "66." Overall, the question has improved by one point each year.

"I was surprised," Hoffner said. "I don't think our water smells, but that's pretty low. Can you explain our plan (for that issue)?"

Russell said one written comment from a respondent expressed displeasure at getting notices about trihalomethane violations in the municipal water system. However, the city manager pointed out that no such notices have been sent out in more than a year.

"It's a perception issue in some cases," Russell said. "I can't explain why all of that is, because we do have water that is meeting quality standards. I can tell you that nationwide the perception of municipal water isn't as great as it is for bottled water. Yet, when they do taste tests, it's usually the municipal water that wins."

Russell also spoke at length about the need to identify areas that have a real impact on a resident's attachment to the community. In one study he cited, those areas include aesthetics, social offerings and openness of opportunity.

"Aesthetics includes parks, trails, playgrounds and other amenities," Russell said. "The perfect example (of aesthetics and social connectivity) is the Meridian Bridge and the conversion of that to a pedestrian trail. There are different opinions on (the project) and some people won't ever use it. But they'll be more satisfied with the community just for the fact that it is there and breathes some vibrancy into the community. It brings people out into the community where they have the opportunity to engage with others and to be a part of something that is a little bit unique to the community itself that other areas might not have."

Trying to get people engaged in the community will be a focus in the next year, Russell continued. He wants to engage the creativity and talent of Yankton's residents and have a public dialogue about opportunities they might want to pursue.

"The more that those things are developed and people feel that they're attached (to Yankton), we have a better probability of bringing other talented people into the community, as well," Russell said.

City Begins Hydrant Flushing

The City of Yankton's water distribution staff began the fall hydrant flushing process Tuesday. Hydrant flushing will take place between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m., starting on the west side of the community and moving east. The primary purpose of the flushing is to verify the proper operation of the fire hydrants through periodic inspection and preventive maintenance. Secondly, the program is the key to mitigating water-quality problems by removing accumulated mineral deposits and sediment from the water mains. Fire hydrant flushing might temporarily reduce water pressure and discolor water. Flushing stirs up sediment, iron and manganese mineral deposits. Discolored water does not pose a health threat, but it can stain laundry and, if consumed, it might have an unpleasant taste or odor. Residents should be certain all the discolored water is out of their homes' plumbing lines and water heaters and that the water is clear before laundering clothes or drinking water. If discolored water stains laundry, do not place the laundry into the dryer because drying will permanently set the stains. Rust remover is available at most grocery stores and should remedy the staining.
