






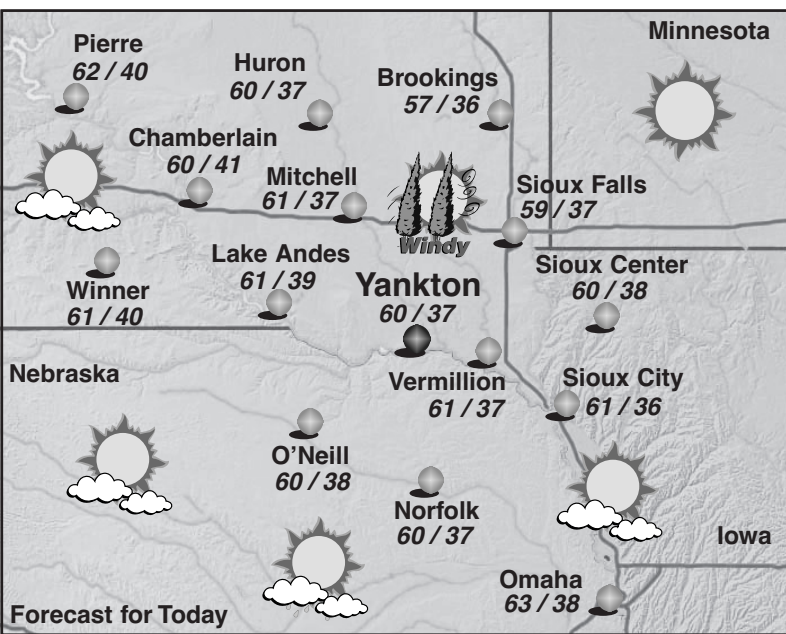

 project manager with the company. "We want to get the foundation in before the ground freezes."
 Owner Tony Baxter added that the casino is scheduled to open early next summer, with the golf course opening the following year.
 "It takes a year to get the grass growing and have the course ready to open," added Ron Erickson, lead architect with Great Horse Group in Minneapolis, Minn., that helped design the project.
 "The tribe has secured 172 acres for this project, with 560 total acres available," Baxter said.
 "We're building this with the idea of expansion in the future," Erickson added.

He said that initial work of the Ohiya project actually began in 2008.
 Shokapee chairman Stan Crooks, who also attended Thursday's ceremony, said many people are skeptical about whether such a large project will work in such a remote location.
 "We are a people that are used to adapting and making changes. All our faith is in the (Santee) tribe," he said.
 "This will easily create 40-50 new permanent jobs for our community," council woman Thelma Thomas said.
 Leavitt said during the construction phase, Baxter hopes to use as much local labor as possible.
 "We're projecting to have as many as 150 workers on site during our peak construction phase," he said.
 A job fair for the project is scheduled to take place in approximately three weeks.

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures mostly fell Thursday on the Chicago Board of Trade.
 Wheat for December delivery dropped 8.75 cents to \$6.18 a bushel; December corn fell 2.50 cents to \$6.3825 a bushel; December oats fell 3.25 cents to \$3.4175 a bushel; while November soybeans rose 17.50 cents to \$12.57 a bushel.
 Beef futures and pork futures rose on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.
 December live cattle rose 1.63 cent to \$1.2285 a pound; November feeder cattle gained 0.13 cent to \$1.4345 a pound; and December lean hogs rose 0.54 cent to 88.02 cents a pound.

intensive cleanup effort was needed to repair damage caused by a severe storm last August. The cleanup effort, along with a scheduled electrical upgrade, prevented the campground from being used for several months.
 Ledbetter said that last year's closure has nothing to do with the latest renovations, which have been planned for quite some time.
 "We've been talking about it for years," he said. "We just finally got the money to do it."
 While Cottonwood opened as planned in April following last year's upgrade, numbers for this year's season were down slightly, Ledbetter said.
 "It's hard to say why," he said about the cause of the lower camping numbers. "Maybe it was the economy, and maybe it was unknowns about flooding and that sort of thing."
 While the work on the entrance might not boost attendance next year, Ledbetter believes it will improve the campground.
 "We look forward to opening up again next year," he said. "And we hope folks will have a better experience."
