The Yankton Bucks will hang another pair of numbers from an already-crowded banner on the east side of the Summit Center main gym, thanks to Friday's 34-29 win over Mitchell that clinched a share of another East-South Dakota Conference football title.

But I'm sure the Bucks would tell you to a player that they don't want that to be the final note on what has been a good season.

First off, the Bucks don't want to share, and a win over Brandon Valley gives the Bucks that title outright. The only thing that kept this from being a winner-take-all affair was Brandon Valley's stumble against Brock-

ings earlier this season.

From there, there are a few more games to contend with. If the Bucks have their way, there are four or five games left in the 2011 season, the last begin played Nov. 12 in the climate-controlled comfort of the Dakota-Dome. (The question is whether the Bucks will get a first-round bye, a possibility opened up by Friday's win.)

But a lot of work stands between game 9 on Thursday and two games in November. Washington and Roosevelt bounced Yankton by a combined 70-14, holding Yankton scoreless for six straight quarters. Mountain West, C-USA Plan Football Merger

The Mountain West and Conference USA are planning to join forces to secure their future in the rapidly changing college football landscape.

The two leagues expect to merge their football operations into one mega-conference that will probably have between 20 and 24 teams in it when it finally gets going in 2013.

The name? They'll come up with one.

Will Boise State and Air Force, among others, stay? They hope.

"I'm just trying to create stability — greater stability — so we're not talking about membership issues," Mountain West commissioner Craig Thompson said Friday night on a conference call. Both

commissioners, Thompson and Conference USA commissioner Britton Banowsky, said the new arrangement will provide the security that top programs need to keep them from jumping ship.

That's clearly the reason for the merger announced Friday, shortly after it came out that Boise State and Air Force — two key Mountain West programs — were being courted by the Big East.

Down to six teams of its own after Syracuse and Pittsburgh announced a pending departure to the ACC, the league generally viewed as the weakest of the automatic qualifiers for the Bowl Championship Series looks set to poach some of the top mid-majors.

A Big East official, speaking on condition of anonymity because the conference had not authorized anyone to speak publicly about its

plans, told The Associated Press that the conference plans to invite Boise State, Air Force and Navy as football-only members, and Central Florida to compete in all sports.

"It's a viable option and it creates stability and that's what they're looking for," Thompson said. "I can't answer what Air Force will do or won't do, but we're going to put a very attractive opportunity on the table for the United States Air Force Academy."

Both Thompson and Banowsky said it's too soon to discuss how

the sprawling league — which could stretch from West Virginia and Florida to Hawaii and Idaho — would handle scheduling.

They were able to emphasize, however, that they would honor their current TV contracts.

"I think definitely the intention is increased television revenue for all members," Thompson said. "We like the new approach because it's different. It's proactive."

AP: Big East To Invite Boise St., 3 Others

NEW YORK (AP) — The Big East's plan to save the conference involves heading West.

The embattled league's leaders have agreed on a plan to invite Boise State, Air Force and Navy as football-only members, and Central Florida to compete in all sports, after they double the exit fee for current members to \$10 million.

Houston and SMU are likely next in line as full members as the Big East tries to get to 12 schools.

An official in the Big East, speaking on condition of anonymity because the conference had not authorized anyone to speak publicly about its plans, told The Associated Press invitations could go out as soon as next week.

Southern Utah took control of the deciding fifth set, 11-10, on a kill by Cashaana Renfro. Renfro later closed the match with a kill that was deflected wide by the Coyotes — a constant problem Friday.

"At least that is something we can own," Houk said.

Kim Buluga added 10 kills in the loss for the Coyotes, while Tori Kroll had 53 set assists. Carol Logato led the defense with 15 digs.

The Summit League's first-place team, Oral Roberts, comes to Vermillion with a 15-4 overall record and 9-1 in the conference. The Golden Eagles have won nine straight games since losing to USD on Sept. 15.

"They're out for blood," Aschoff said, cracking a smile. "We have practice (today) and we can fix some things."
