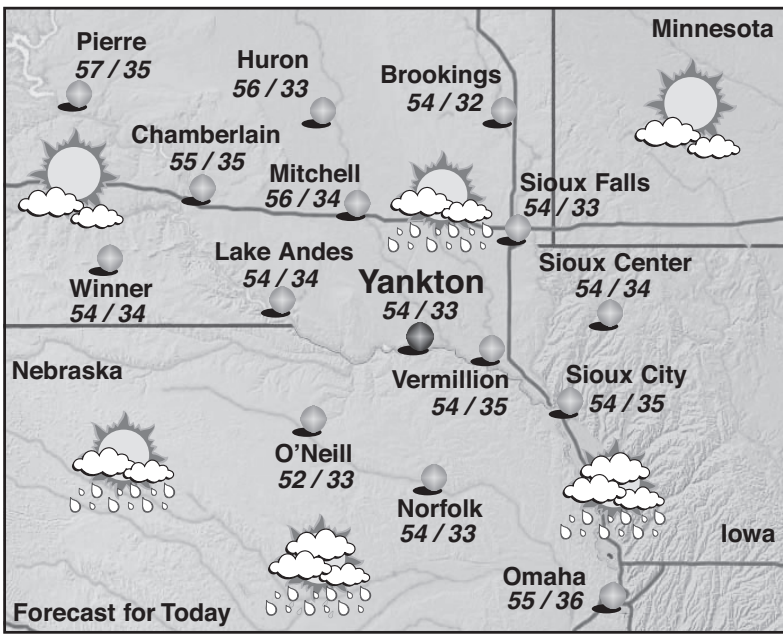

Marcus Briggs-Cloud Set For Cash Lecture

VERMILLION — Marcus Briggs-Cloud, from the Great Maskoke Nation of Florida, will present the 17th annual Joseph Harper Cash Memorial Lecture at the University of South Dakota at 7 p.m. on Thursday, Oct. 20, at Farber Hall. Briggs-Cloud is a son of the Wind clan and a grandson of the Bird clan. He is an indigenous rights activist and a musician. Currently, Briggs-Cloud teaches language, philosophy and history at the College of the Muscogee Nation. A graduate of the University of Oklahoma, Briggs-Cloud also holds a degree in theological studies from Harvard University. His presentation is free and open to the public. A program of the USD Institute of American Indian Studies, the Cash Memorial Lecture was inaugurated in 1995 to promote education and awareness of American Indian culture, issues and problems. Supported by an endowment established by Joseph Harper Cash's family and friends, the lecture annually features scholars in the fields of Indian studies, frontier, Western and mining history — the four major areas of Cash's interests. Cash, from Bonesteel, was dean of the College of Arts & Sciences at USD for a decade. In his lifetime, he forged lifelong friendships with Indian and non-Indian people, and admonished his students to remember history from small places. His memorial lecture series is built on that thesis.

Neb. Man Dies In River Accident Near Wynot

WYNOT, Neb. — An Allen, Neb., man died Sunday morning when his skid loader fell into the Missouri River near Wynot, Neb. According to a press release from the Cedar County Sheriff's Office, Richard McCorkindale, 79, was operating the skid loader near an embankment on private property just west of the Brooky Bottom recreational area southeast of Yankton. The vehicle apparently slipped down the embankment and became submerged in the river. Divers from the Yankton Search

and Rescue Unit were called in to locate the loader. They pulled McCorkindale from the wreckage. He was pronounced dead at the scene. The incident was determined to be an accident. The accident is being investigated by Cedar County Sheriff's Office, with assistance from Nebraska Game and Parks. Also assisting in the incident were crews from, Wynot Fire and EMS, Lifenet Air Medical Helicopter, Yankton Emergency Management and emergency responders, and Cedar County Emergency Management.
