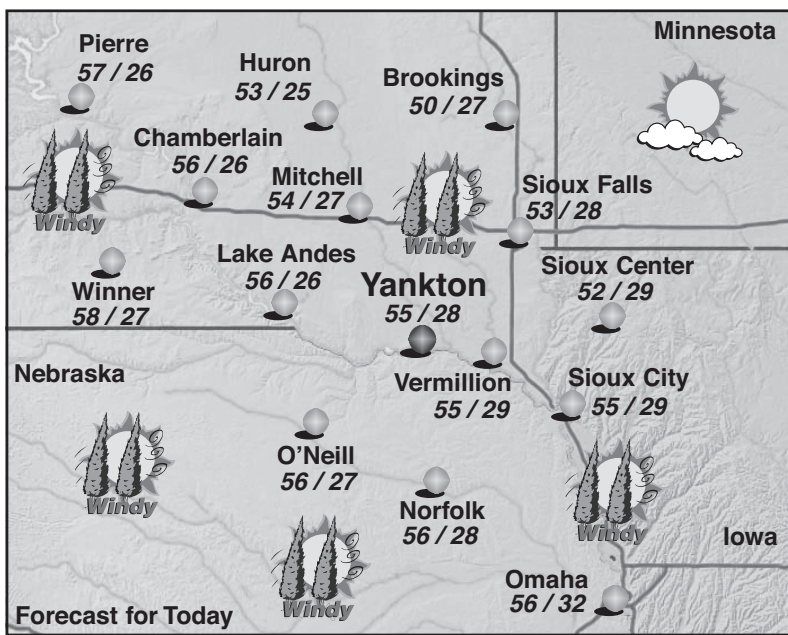

Forum On Bullying Set For YMS Oct. 24

A forum on bullying, sexual harassment, sexting, cyberbullying and digital safety will be held at 7 p.m. Monday, Oct. 24, at the Yankton Middle School Auditorium. This will be an education program that targets a wide group of individuals, including students, teachers and staff operating within the school environment, and parents and the greater community operating outside the school environment. The program provides training to school staff, educates students regarding bullying/cyberbullying and its dangers, and addresses the com-

munity to raise awareness of bullying and gain support for anti-bullying policies. It is important to educate and engage all of the groups involved with bullying activities, including bullies, victims, peer onlookers, and adults. Presenters discuss the verbal and nonverbal, direct, indirect, physical and emotional expressions of bullying, the legal ramifications of these behaviors, and technological (sexting, cyberbullying) and other vehicles for these behaviors. This presentation is appropriate for parents, teachers, counselors and community members.

Beef futures and pork futures mostly rose on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. December live cattle rose 0.45 cent to \$1.2365 a pound; November feeder cattle was unchanged at \$1.4442 a pound; and December lean hogs rose 0.63 cent to 90.70 cents a pound.
