'Pennies From Heaven' Campaign Hits Yankton

Through Oct. 25, shoppers at the J.C. Penney Yankton Mall are invited to turn small change into "pennies from heaven" by rounding up their purchases and donating the difference to a local after-school program.

Boys & Girls Club of Yankton is one of 1,100 afterschool organizations from across the country matched with a local J.C. Penney store that will benefit from the proceeds raised during the Pennies From Heaven campaign.

"With a new school year already underway, we shouldn't forget about the resources needed to keep kids involved in a positive learning environment after school," said Rachel Schumacher, director of operations for the Boys & Girls Club of Yankton. "As customers shop J.C. Penney this fall, we hope they will keep our mission in mind so that the social and academic learning opportunities we provide after school will continue to be available to Yankton students."

National research shows that one out of four students in the U.S. is on their own between the hours of 3 p.m. and 6 p.m. each day. The afterschool program offered at Boys & Girls of Yankton serves more than 360 students each year by involving them in programs that help kids develop social skills, provide opportunities to be physically active and achieve academic success in school. One of the programs offered daily at the Club is Power Hour. Power Hour offers a time for youth to work on their homework while receiving assistance from adult volunteers and staff members. Another popular activity called Mind Mission gives them the opportunity to work on educational activities that are staff led (example: science experiments).

"For more than a decade, J.C. Penney has been deeply committed to helping kids spread their wings by making it possible for more students to participate in life-enriching afterschool programs," said Gary Munyer, store manager for J.C. Penney. "When we leverage the power of a penny to create opportunities for learning, we can make a positive difference in the lives of our future leaders."

While Smolnisky gave a brief overview of each of the topics, the real goal of the meeting was to get the participants talking amongst themselves, Fruechte said.

"That is where the real ideas for change are going to come from," she said. "My job is to get them talking here, so that when they leave they will hopefully go out and talk with others in the community. That discussion and access to honest, nonpartisan facts will be the real driver and measurement of the success of this program."

Following Smolnisky's presentation, the participants broke into small discussion groups with the goal of finding one best possible solution to an issue facing the state budgeting process.

"The ideas that they come up

with here, even the ones not written on the board, will be compiled and shared with the intent to help give others in the state possible ideas for change," Smolnisky said. "It is part of our research grant from the Bush Foundation to do these events throughout the state."

After voting on which topics those in attendance wished to discuss, it was clear that school funding was a popular issue. Medicaid funding and finding other forms of revenue were also selected as break-out sessions.

"While this is only the second of the 14 planned meetings, we are finding that people in the state are very interested in what is going on, but maybe just are not sure what they can do to affect change," Smolnisky said. "We are giving them the tools to get involved. We are teaching them that now is the time to get involved with their legislators, not in January when the session is so busy. Many times we find that the legislators are voting on issues

when they are not really sure how their constituents would want them to vote. We hope that by inviting them to the discussions here we are helping them as well."

All three District 18 legislators — Sen. Jean Hunhoff, Rep. Nick Moser and Rep. Bernie Hunhoff — were in attendance at Tuesday's meeting. So, too, was District 19 Rep. Frank Kloucek, of Scotland.

"Citizen involvement is vital to making our state government work," Smolnisky said. "By understanding the fiscal pictures and the budget process, local citizens can influence fiscal policy. That can only help insure that the state budget reflects the needs and values of its citizens."

The next area opportunity to attend the SDBPP will be held in Vermillion on Wednesday, Nov. 16 from 11 a.m.-1:30 p.m. Location and RSVP address will be announced.

BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures traded mixed Tuesday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for December delivery rose 1 cent to \$6.2525 a bushel; December corn added 3.5 cents to \$6.44 a bushel; December oats fell 0.5 cent to \$3.39 a bushel; while November soybeans dropped 2.25 cents to \$12.5075 a bushel.

Beef futures fell while pork futures rose on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

December live cattle shed 0.33 cent to \$1.2332 a pound; November feeder cattle fell 1.02 cent to \$1.4340 a pound; while December lean hogs rose 0.25 cent to 90.95 cents a pound.

feasible.

"The federal government won't allow you to back that water up on somebody else unless you get approval through the Corps of Engineers and the Federal Emergency Management Agency," Moore said. "That's unlikely to happen. The state is having a heck of a time with it up by Watertown along Highway 81. They're having to pump the water out of there because they can't raise the level of the road anymore. Our hands are tied as far as raising the level of the road."

In other business Tuesday, the commission agreed to pay for the replacement of an eight foot in diameter, 80-foot long culvert northwest of Irene along 293rd Street in Turkey Valley Township.

The commission agreed to pay up to \$16,000 for the replacement of the culvert based on cost estimates provided by township officials.

Also Tuesday, the commission:

- was asked by Department of Equalization Director Lori Mackey and Zoning Administrator Pat Garrity to budget approximately \$51,000, which could be paid during the course of three years, for high-resolution aerial photography of the county. The City of Yankton has budgeted about \$20,000 in 2012 to get photography of the community. Mackey said it makes sense to share the costs of the project with the city as the county has done in the past. Garrity and Mackey said their offices use the aerial photography taken several years ago on a daily basis, and it is important to keep it updated;
- agreed to appoint Yankton Police Chief Brian Paulsen, Yankton Police Systems Manager Julia Hussein and Yankton County Sheriff Jim Vlahakis to the county's E-911 committee. Moore cast the sole "no" vote due to his concerns about the legality of Paulsen living in Nebraska and directing the use of South Dakota 911 funds. However, the rest of the board agreed to appoint him on the condition that Vlahakis would investigate whether it is allowable;
- discussed a five-year capital outlay plan for road improvement proposed by Moore. He laid out 16 transportation system priorities for the county during that time. The commission agreed to meet prior to its regular meeting time Nov. 1 to hammer out a final plan amongst themselves.

Corps' public meetings on its Annual Operating Plan (AOP). The basin meetings include sessions Nov. 2 in Pierre and Nov. 3 in Sioux City.

South Dakota holds a high stake in the river, Johnson said.

"There are no easy answers, but the issue of flood control on the Missouri River is vitally important to the economy and people of South Dakota," he said. "Roads, utilities and drinking water infrastructure have suffered significant damage in communities and on Indian reservations along the Missouri. The economic and emotional impacts of the flooding have been tremendous."
