"There are so many outdoor activities that fit in so nicely with the typical visitors that are coming to South Dakota. One of our challenges is to get back to Pierre and figure out ways that we can partner with this area to get more visitors here to generate tax dollars."

Local leaders of the tourism industry were glad to see Hagen familiarizing himself with southeast South Dakota and opening the door to future cooperation.

"I definitely see some marketing partnerships developing not only with Yankton but also the Lewis and Clark Recreation Area and the Department of Tourism," said Yankton Convention and Visitors Bureau Director Lisa Scheve, who accompanied Hagen on his tour of the Yankton area.

"That's one thing we really wanted to explore and look at: How can we all partner together? Whether it's through print, television, radio or social media, I think there are a lot of things we can work together on, and we're just starting those conversations about how we can get there and get those things accomplished."

Jacquie Fuks, director of the Southeast South Dakota Tourism Association, was with the Department of Tourism officials on both days of their visit.

"I think they were very impressed with what there is to see and do (in Bon Homme County) and the pride these people have in their communities," she said.

Discover Bon Homme was formed in January and received a Matching Dollar Challenge grant last summer through the South Dakota Department of Tourism. It was awarded \$1,150 to assist in paying for a brochure and website.

"I think it's good for the Department of Tourism to get out and actually see the places that we are telling them about," Fuks said. "It also gives the people in those communities a little show-and-tell time."

Hagen said another main reason to visit the area was to follow up with tourism officials after Missouri River flooding.

"It was a challenging summer. There is no doubt about it," he stated. "Flooding dominated so much of the news coming out of this state. We spent the entire summer correcting the misconceptions about it."

"We knew high gas prices would be a problem, and we planned for that," Hagen continued. "We knew the economy was a challenge. We knew people were concerned about the hassles of air travel. What we did not plan for is what I call the left hook — the flooding. That really knocked us down on the mat. But we're a resilient group in the visitors industry, so we got back up."

He said misinformation in the national media caused a lot of potential visitors to not come.

"We're expecting next year will be better," Hagen said.

Although no official numbers were in to document pheasant hunters visiting the state for opening weekend, he said anecdotal evidence was good. With pheasant numbers believed to be down an average of 46 percent across the state, there are concerns about what impact it will have on hunter traffic.

"We've had a lot of feedback from around the country with people saying, 'We understand your numbers are down, so we're not coming,'" Hagen said. "The message we send back to these folks is, 'Yes, the numbers are down. But you've got to realize that it's still world-class pheasant hunting. It's the best in the world, and you should still get out here.'"

to the Saturday of Labor Day weekend, which next year falls on Sept. 1, would increase the chances of a better atmosphere for the vendors, bands and people who come down to enjoy the party.

"Our goal is to make it a big event," he said. "We want to take the weather out of the equation. By moving it to this weekend, it puts us a week before Vermillion's Ribfest and two weeks earlier than we have been holding it. Also that weekend is the big triathlon, so we are hoping we can make Yankton a bit more of a weekend destination that weekend."

While the event has been billed as Yankton's final block party of the summer, Hanten said there is always room for more to attend. Since Labor Day is also a big camping weekend at area campgrounds, he said it has the potential of pulling more out-of-town visitors to the event.

"It would make a great evening event for those staying out at the lake to come and enjoy," he said.

The other potential change for the event is a possible revamping of the band line-up.

"We are looking at an increase in the amount of resources we are going to put into the event, as well. We want to be able to get some different, bigger bands to play the event to have more of a draw."
