USD To Host 8th U.S. Circuit Court Of Appeals

VERMILLION — Three judges from the 8th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals will hear oral arguments at 10 a.m., Wednesday, Oct. 26, in the courtroom of the University of South Dakota School of Law. The panel will consist of the Chief Judge William Jay Riley of Omaha, Neb., federal Judge Roger L. Wollman of Sioux Falls and senior Judge C. Arlen Beam of Lincoln, Neb. "Hosting the Court provides our students a remarkable opportunity to learn issues in federal law, see law in action and observe excellent appellate advocacy skills," said USD School of Law Dean Thomas E. Geu. "We are honored that the Court is able to come to USD School of Law."

Riley has been an active judge on the Court since 2001 and was named chief judge in 2010. Beam was appointed in 1987 and became a senior judge in 2001. Wollman, a 1962 graduate of USD School of Law, was appointed to the Court in 1985 and served as chief judge from 1999 to 2002.

The 8th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals is a federal court with appellate jurisdiction over the U.S. District Courts in Arkansas, Iowa, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, North Dakota and South Dakota. It is based on St. Louis and is among 13 U.S. Courts of Appeals, just below the Supreme Court of the United States.

Cases scheduled for oral argument are Christiansen v. West Branch Community School District, U.S. v. Thomas and State of South Dakota v. United States Department of the Interior. A summary of the cases is available at www.usd.edu/law/upload/Case-Synopses.pdf.

Former SEC Chair To Speak At USD

VERMILLION — Christopher Cox, the 28th chairman of the Securities and Exchange Commission, will present the 2011 Arthur A. Volk Accounting Symposium/Ethics Lecture at the University of South Dakota at 7 p.m. on Wednesday, Oct. 26, at the Wayne S. Knutson Theatre. Cox, an accomplished lawmaker and reformer, will speak about the complex regulatory environment and its long-term impact on business. He addresses the current economic climate from the point of view of someone who understands the need for free markets, fiscal responsibility, and a robust U.S. business community.

As chairman of the Securities and Exchange Commission, Cox made vigorous enforcement of the securities laws a top priority. He brought groundbreaking cases against a variety of market abuses, including hedge fund insider trading, stock options back-

dating, fraud aimed at senior citizens and securities scams on the Internet.

Cox spent 17 years in Congress where he served in the majority leadership of the U.S. House of Representatives. In 1994

he was appointed by President Clinton to the bipartisan commission on entitlement and tax reform. From 1986 until 1988, Cox served as senior associate counsel to President Reagan. Today, he is a partner at the Corporate, M&A and Securities Group at Bingham McCutchen and a principal at the Bingham Consulting Group. He received an M.B.A. from Harvard Business School and a J.D. from Harvard Law School, where he was an editor of the Harvard Law Review.

Grants Now Available For 4-H Clubs, FFA/FCCLA

PIERRE — The South Dakota Department of Agriculture announces that grant funding is now available through the Building Our South Dakota Rural Communities grant program.

Grants are open to 4-H Clubs, FFA Chapters, and Family Career and Community Leaders of America (FCCLA) Chapters.

These grants were developed to demonstrate the importance of rural communities and the value of organizations working together to improve rural life.

There are two types of grants available. The basic grant is used for community improvement projects and is limited to \$750 per project. The safety grant is used for projects that enhance public safety and is limited to \$200 per project.

Any 4-H club or FFA/FCCLA chapter in South Dakota can apply for the grant. Applications are due by Oct. 31, 2011. Awards are announced at the end of November.

Centerville Receives Grant for Sewer Upgrade

PIERRE — The community of Centerville will soon have a more efficient sewer system, thanks in part to a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) approved this week by Gov. Dennis Daugaard.

The governor awarded Centerville with \$309,000 in CDBG funds to rehabilitate more than 22,600 linear feet of sanitary sewer line. The grant will also help pay for the rehabilitation of 10 manholes. Centerville's current system

was constructed in 1939.

"Centerville's sewer system suffers from numerous cracks, broken segments and has roots growing into the pipes," said Gov. Daugaard. "This upgrade will lead to cost and energy savings for the community and more efficient wastewater treatment."

CDBG is a reimbursement program, and Centerville will receive funds as work is completed. The program provides commu-

nities with financial resources to address a wide range of unique community development needs. Past grants have been used for improvements and construction of community buildings, water systems, and sewer systems.

The federal Department of Housing and Urban Development funds the CDBG Program, and the Governor's Office of Economic Development administers it.
