**Lancers Survive Error-Prone Performance**

The fans at Laddie E. Cimpl Arena were dressed pretty in pink, but the play on the court was anything but pretty.

Friday night was the annual Mount Marty Volleyball "Dig Pink" event. The event has raised \$1,500 for the Avera Sacred Heart Cancer Center in the past two years. While the "Dig Pink" attraction drew a boisterous crowd, the focus of the night was on the match between the Mount Marty Lancers and The College of St. Mary's Flames.

The Lancers jumped out to an early 20-11 lead in the first set of the match and seemed to be on their way to a quick victory over the visiting Flames from Omaha, but from that point on the match was played closely the rest of the way. Mount Marty was able to convert at crucial points in the game and came out victorious over the Flames 25-21, 25-23, 21-25, 25-19.

"I am happy that it is a win, but it was not our best performance," Mount Marty coach Candice Climer said. "We are excited we won, but we all felt that it should have been much cleaner."

The Lancers seemed to be in control all night, but the score remained tight because of simple Mount Marty mistakes. The Lancers had 12 serving errors on the night and 19 hitting errors, numbers that typically will push a team to a loss. Mount Marty also committed five serve receive errors during the match, another fairly high amount.

But despite the mental mistakes and unforced errors the Lancers were able to attack well enough on offense to clinch the win against St. Mary's. The offense got a huge night from a left-handed freshman Kristen Boyle.

Boyle has not been a consistent member of the Lancers' starting lineup, but has been playing more frequently as of late. For the night Boyle had 10 kills with three hitting errors.

"Kristen had a great game," Climer said. "Lefties are hard to match up against, and her hitting really threw off the defense."

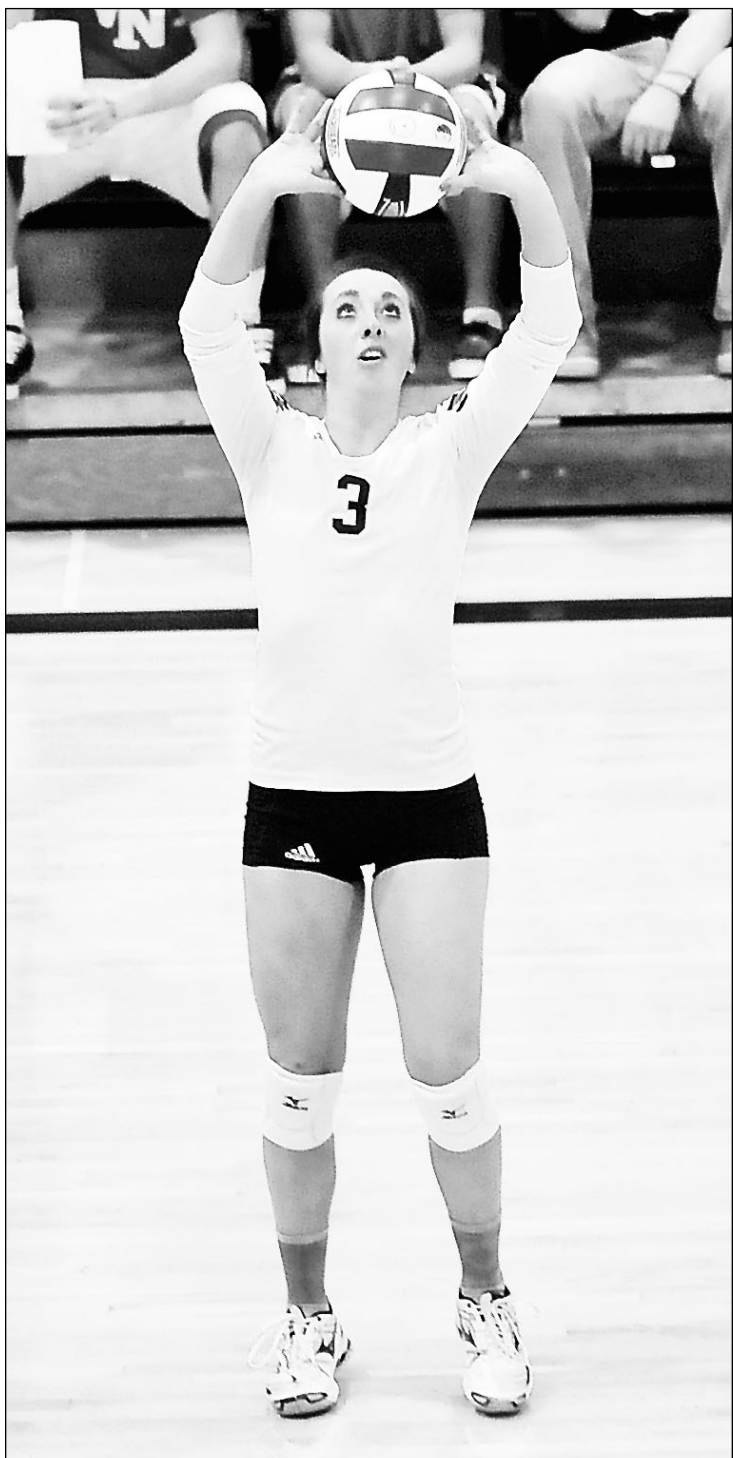
Boyle was followed closely in hitting by senior Carlie Lambert, who had 10 kills and five hitting errors. Lambert also had three ace serves on the night.

"Carlie's three aces came at big points of the game when we were on runs that led to set wins," Climer said.

St. Mary's came into the match hoping to finally get over their Great Plains Athletic Conference curse. The Flames are not a member of the GPAC, but the match against the Lancers was their tenth match against a GPAC team. Their record against the GPAC before tonight was 0-9.

"We had confidence we could beat them after seeing their record against GPAC schools," Climer said. "But it worried me that although they were losing, they were playing right with the top teams in our conference."

After a third set loss by the Lancers the confidence of the Flames had gone up and a big point could have pushed the momentum in St. Mary's favor to beat

The fourth set score was 7-6 in favor of the Lancers when a big kill by Jena Peters ignited a 10-0 Mount Marty run, a run that would eventually clinch the set and clinch the match for the Lancers.

A relieved Climer was able to unwind after the stressful game and light-heartedly commented on a practice strategy that may have backfired.

"Yesterday in practice we focused on eliminating unforced errors," Climer said. "If we had consecutive unforced errors then we had to run. It was like Karma came back and got us for focusing on that yesterday."

For the night the Lancers Jena Peters had seven kills, four solo blocks, and two assisted blocks. Amanda Dirksen had six kills and only one hitting error, and six digs. Kate Lingscheit also had a strong effort at the net with eight kills and only one hitting error. Jen Jerdee

led the defense with 18 digs, and Caitlyn Ilig had 12 digs. Set assist stats were not available, but junior setter Tina Rowbotham set her 1,000th career set assist in the first set of the match.

St. Mary's was led by Ashley Iwanski with 10 kills and seven digs. Jess Kuehner, a powerful left-hander, had nine kills. Baylee Collins and Courtney Iwanski led the Flames defense with eight digs apiece, and Brittney Lester and Kaylee Wallace each had 17 set assists.

Mount Marty will face another non-conference opponent today, Oct. 22, as they take on Grace University. The match is set to begin at 1 p.m. at Laddie E. Cimpl Arena.
