Then, of course, came the challenge of juggling volleyball with the second year at Avera Sacred Heart School of Radiologic Technology.

Realizing that her radiology schedule would monopolize most of her time, Lambert started mapping out volleyball practices with MMC coach Candice Climer. From there, the other Lancer players were willing to work around those available slots for Lambert — a willingness Climer calls “proof that they’re all really close.”

“It’s been a little bit of a struggle, because I had to figure out how to manage my time,” Lambert said. “Coach has been really easy to work with. If it wasn’t for her, I wouldn’t be able to do what I’m doing.”

For example, if Lambert works at the hospital from 1-10 p.m., the team will have practice early in the morning. Or if she works an overnight shift — typically from 8 p.m.-6 a.m. — they will practice at night.

“Right now when she comes in, it’s hard because we try to get her to clear her mind,” Climer said. “It’s just not a flip you can switch, but she still does it. ... And I honestly have no idea how.”

Easing some of the pressure of her shoulders, Lambert takes her three classes a week — Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday — at the hospital, from 1-4 p.m.

On Mondays and Fridays, she will be at the hospital from 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m., and will usually go right to Cimpl Arena for practices or matches.

Lambert is not unique in that she handles academic work on top of other obligations, but it

does not mean it’s not challenging, according to Anessa Van Osdel, program director at Avera Sacred Heart School of Radiologic Technology.

“I know they all have outside lives, and Carlie has volleyball, but it’s a juggling act for her,” Van Osdel said. “All the students have to balance things, but she does a really good job of it. I know it’s challenging sometimes.”

Lambert is one of 12 students, broken up into first-year and second-year, in two classes at Avera Sacred Heart. Every week, she is stationed in a different area, Van Osdel said, and that cycle rotates every six weeks.

Volleyball or otherwise, Lambert does the exact same things as her classmates, she said.

“I can see where they’re coming from, school comes first, no matter what,” she said. “As long as I’m working the same amount of hours and it’s not unfair to other students, we’ve been able to make it work. I owe a lot to both places.”

Making it work for volleyball has presented some obstacles, however.

The Lancers opened their season Aug. 30 with two matches in Omaha, Neb., against Union College and Grace University. With the first match set for 6 p.m., the team left earlier that afternoon for a nearly three-hour bus ride, however Lambert didn’t get out of class until 4 p.m.

To make it work, Lambert was able to work out an arrangement with her mother’s company to fly on a private plane from Yankton to Omaha, where Climer’s husband picked up Lambert at the airport.

“She told me, ‘I’m not going to miss those games, it’s my senior year,’” Climer said. “I didn’t think she could make it, but she got there in perfect time to warm up.”

Not only was she there, Lambert combined to record 22 kills

with only five attack errors as Mount Marty won both matches in convincing 3-0 decisions.

“I want to be able to show the school and the team that I’m truly there for each thing, do whatever I can to make sure they both happen,” Lambert said. “It’s my senior year, and I set goals for myself and this team, so each match is important. ... I had to figure out something.”

Since that opening day, Lambert has missed only one practice — because of an overnight shift — and has not missed a match, though she occasionally follows the MMC bus with an assistant because of time conflicts.

Despite the hectic schedule, Lambert remains optimistic around her teammates.

“It always cracks me up when I ask her how it’s going and she says, ‘I’m just living the dream, coach,’” Climer said. “We tell her that once the season’s over, maybe she’ll get a little break.”

“But the scary thing is, she’ll still have crazy hours.”

Scheduled to graduate from radiology school in August, Lambert is nearing the end of her volleyball career. Following this weekend’s two matches, the Lancers have five remaining — three at home, plus road matches at Briar Cliff and Dakota Wesleyan.

Not alone in her balancing act, Lambert is an inspiration to her teammates, Rowbotham said.

“With her, you see that if you put your mind to it, you can seriously do anything,” the Brookings native said. “I see all these stories on TV about players who also do this all this other stuff, but we’ve got the hardest worker right here in Yankton.”

Added Lambert, following a long pause after discussing her class schedule, “I’ve had some close calls, but it’s all been worth it.”

Public Notice: Street Trees

Yankton property owners are reminded to trim trees adjacent to sidewalks and streets. City Ordinance requires a **10 foot** clearance over sidewalks and a **12 foot** clearance over streets and alleys. Maintaining these clearances may take multiple trimmings annually. Low hanging tree branches can damage vehicles and maintenance equipment. During the winter months, low hanging branches make it difficult to keep streets clear and may damage snowplows.

Street tree trimmings can be dropped off free of charge at the landfill from 10/29/11 through 11/05/11 during business hours (excluding Wednesday nights).
