no one else miscalculates that." In an interview released Saturday, Iranian President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad said Tehran has "a very good relationship" with Iraq's government, and said the relationship will continue to grow.

"We have deepened our ties day by day," Ahmadinejad said in the interview, broadcast Saturday on CNN.

The timeline for U.S. troop withdrawals had been agreed to by President George W. Bush and Iraqi leaders. Obama had campaigned for the presidency with the promise to end America's war in Iraq.

For months the Obama administration negotiated with Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki and other Iraqi officials to extend the stay of troops and to build permanent bases. Both sides saw advantages to keeping several thousand U.S. troops in Iraq as part of a training mission, but there was also strong opposition in the U.S. and Iraq for the American troops to stay.

A sticking point was the U.S. demand that American troops be granted legal immunity to shield them from Iraqi prosecution, a flashpoint for Iraqi anger over the Americans' special status in their homeland.

In Iraq, cheers and fears greeted Obama's announcement as the country

pondered another period of uncertain transition. While many celebrated what they viewed as the end of a foreign occupation, there was also apprehension over what would happen without U.S. troops on hand to help control political and social divisions that still spark shootings and bombings.

Arizona Sen. John McCain, the top Republican on the Senate Armed Services Committee, called the withdrawal decision "a serious mistake" that is viewed in the region as a victory for Iran. He also said the presence of U.S. bases elsewhere in the region will have little impact on Iraq.

"There was never really serious negotiations between the administration and the Iraqis," McCain told "This Week" on ABC. "I believe we could have negotiated an agreement. And I'm very, very concerned about increased Iranian influence in Iraq."

Sen. Lindsey Graham, who also serves on the committee, criticized Obama for "not being able to close the deal" with Iraq, and he said the Iraqis remain emboldened with "a shot in Iraq they would never had otherwise." He also expressed concern over Iran's nuclear program.

"The Iraqis don't fear us at all," Graham said on "Fox News Sunday." He added: "At a time when we need troops in Iraq to secure the place against intervention by Iran and the bad actors in the region, we are going into 2012 with none. It was his job, the Obama administration's job, to end this well. They failed."

citing any estimates. Erdogan said rescue work would continue through the night.

Up to 80 buildings collapsed in Erceis, including a dormitory, and 10 buildings collapsed in Van, the Turkish Red Crescent said. The sheer number of collapsed buildings gave rise to fears that the death toll could rise substantially.

U.S. scientists recorded over 100 aftershocks in eastern Turkey within 10 hours of the quake, including one with a magnitude of 6.0. Authorities advised people to stay away from damaged homes, warning they could collapse in the aftershocks.

Residents in Van and Erceis lit campfires, preparing to spend the night outdoors while the Red Crescent began setting up tents in a stadium. Others sought shelter with relatives in nearby villages.

Rescue efforts went deep into the night under generator-powered floodlights. Workers tied steel rods around large concrete slabs in Van, then lifted them with heavy machinery.

Residents sobbed outside the ruins of one flattened eight-story building, hoping that missing relatives would be found. Witnesses said eight people were pulled from the rubble, but frequent aftershocks hampered search efforts. By late evening, some joy emerged as a ninth, a teenage girl, was pulled out alive.

Erdogan urged residents to stay away from damaged buildings and promised assistance to all survivors.

"We won't leave anyone to fend for themselves in the cold of winter," he said.

Around 1,275 rescue teams from 38 provinces were being sent to the region, officials said, and troops were also assisting search-and-rescue efforts.

In Erceis, heavy machinery halted and people were ordered to keep silent as rescuers tried to listen for possible survivors inside a seven-story building housing 28 families, NTV reported.

Some inmates escaped a prison in Van after one of its walls collapsed. TRT television said around 150 inmates had fled, but a prison official said the number was much smaller and many later returned.

Nazmi Gur, a legislator from Van, said his nephew's funeral ceremony was cut short due to the quake and he rushed back to help.

"We managed to rescue a few people but I saw at least five bodies," Gur told The Associated Press. "It was such a powerful temblor. It lasted for such a long time," "But now we have no electricity, there is no heating, everyone is outside in the cold," he added.

Authorities had no information yet on remote villages but the provincial governor was touring the region by helicopter and the government sent in tents, field kitchens and blankets.

The earthquake also shook buildings in neighboring Armenia and Iran.

In the Armenian capital of Yerevan, 100 miles (160 kilometers) from Erceis, people rushed into the streets in fear but no damage or injuries were reported. Armenia was the site of a devastating earthquake in 1988 that killed 25,000 people.

Sunday's quake caused panic in several Iranian towns close to the Turkish border and caused cracks in buildings in the city of Chaldoran, Iranian state TV reported.

Leaders around the world conveyed their condolences and offered assistance.

Hundreds Rally In Support Of Iranian Opposition

WASHINGTON — Hundreds of people rallied outside the White House on Saturday, calling on President Barack Obama to remove an Iranian opposition group once allied with Saddam Hussein's Iraqi regime from the U.S. list of terrorist organizations.

Former Pennsylvania Govs. Tom Ridge and Ed Rendell were among speakers urging the U.S. to take the Mujahedin-e Khalq off the State Department's list. Ridge, a Republican, was the nation's first homeland security secretary. Rendell is a top Democrat who helped elect Obama.

"The only group that should be on the list is the country of Iran itself, under the rule of the mullahs," Ridge said, noting recent U.S. allegations of a foiled Iranian plot to assassinate Saudi Arabia's ambassador in Washington.

The U.S. added MEK to its terrorist list in 1997. But last year a federal court ordered the State Department to reconsider and meanwhile the group has rallied many members of Congress and former high-ranking U.S. officials to its cause.

Delisting would allow the Paris-based group to raise money and operate in the U.S., which it is currently prohibited from doing.

The MEK carried out a series of bombings and assassinations against Iran's clerical regime in the 1980s and fought alongside Saddam's forces in the Iran-Iraq war. But the group says it renounced violence in 2001.

New White House Usher Brings Jamaican Charm

WASHINGTON — Angella Reid was fixing Christmas dinner when the phone rang. It was her boss at Jamaica's Half Moon resort calling to say that a key staff member hadn't showed up for work and Reid needed to fill in.

"But I'm cooking for my family!" a teenage Reid protested, and then the tears began to flow as her boss insisted, "There is work to be done."

Reid dried her tears, served dinner and reported to work. "She couldn't believe that I called her in to work," remembers her former boss, Myrtle Dwyer. "She came in, after she had done family dinner, and we were happy together."

Fresh out of high school in Kingston, Reid found her life's calling in the hotel business and quickly learned the sacrifices that come when your job is to put other people's comfort first.

Now, after more than three decades working in hospitality, Reid is ready to take charge at one of the world's most exclusive residential establishments, the White House.

Next month, Reid becomes White House chief usher, only the ninth person to hold the job and the first woman in the position. She replaces retired Rear Adm. Stephen Rochon, who moved to the Department of Homeland Security.

Chief usher is a quaint title for a demanding position. Reid will oversee day-to-day operations at the president's home, a 132-room mansion with a staff of more than 90 people ranging from plumbers and electricians to butlers and cooks. She'll cater to everyone from A-list guests at state dinners to throngs of kids at the annual Easter egg roll.

In recognition of the many facets to the job, the usher's title was recently expanded to include "director of the president's executive residence."

"To say that she was hopeful and excited couldn't possibly describe how badly she hoped she was chosen for this position," says Jean Cohen, who mentored Reid in Marriott's management program when both were in New York in the 1990s. "This was her absolute dream position."

Yet even Reid's closest friends didn't have a clue a White House job was in the offing until her selection was announced.

"It was kept very hush-hush," says Brenda Belding-Topping, a longtime friend and colleague from the Ritz-Carlton organization.

Discretion may be one of the most important qualities needed for the chief usher.

In addition to seeing that things run smoothly throughout the White House, Reid will work to ensure the White House remains a home where two busy parents, their two daughters and the family dog feel comfortable and have their privacy.

In years past, the usher's job description has included everything from hunting down Caroline Kennedy's lost hamsters to getting the marriage license for President Woodrow Wilson, according to Claire Faulkner, writing in "White House History," the journal of the White House Historical Association.

President Lyndon Johnson wanted a multi-head, high-pressure shower that required serious plumbing work, according to a memoir by former usher J.B. West. Nancy Reagan was so appreciative of the longtime service of Rex Scouten, chief usher to four presidents, that she named her King Charles spaniel "Rex."

To say the usher must cater to a lot of guests is an understatement. More than a million people pass through the White House every year.
