BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures rose Monday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for December delivery rose 10.50 cents to \$6.4250 a bushel; December corn rose 1.75 cent to \$6.51 a bushel; December oats rose 4 cents to \$3.41 a bushel; while November soybeans jumped 14.50 cents to \$12.2675 a bushel.

Beef futures rose while pork futures fell on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

December live cattle rose 0.72 cent to \$1.2287 a pound; November feeder cattle gained 0.08 cent to \$1.4280 a pound; while December lean hogs fell 0.83 cent to 88.82 cents a pound.

Yankton Police Chief Now Officially Certified

Yankton Police Chief Brian Paulsen has received certification to be a law enforcement officer in South Dakota.

As a certified officer from Nebraska, Paulsen had a year from the time of his hiring in June 2010 to get reciprocity training in South Dakota to become a certified law enforcement officer here. However, because of limited training opportunities — and, finally, a delayed training session — he had not obtained his certification by June.

In August, Paulsen failed a handgun shooting test. However, last week he completed the test with a passing score.

Paulsen said he is glad to finally have the certificate, which was issued Oct. 19, in his possession.

"It was humbling to say the least. I have never had an issue qualifying," he stated. "I could have remained a 'civilian' police chief but viewed that as unfair to

(Yankton City Manager) Doug Russell, who had the faith in me to lead the Yankton Police Department."

Having no certification meant that Paulsen could not write citations and arrest people, but he could perform the administrative duties expected of him.

While not having law enforcement certification may have appeared problematic to observers unfamiliar with the position, Russell has maintained that the police chief is not expected to perform anything but administrative duties.

Paulsen received some criticism from Yankton citizens over the matter, and he acknowledged as much in his comments via e-mail to the Press & Dakotan.

"I'll close by saying it's good that the citizens take an active role in their government," he said. "The community will see this same perseverance when the Yankton Police Department faces problems in our community. I've got a great staff here, and I'm lucky to be leading them."
