quences.

"When they send this stuff, they don't get to see the personal interaction," he said. "If I say something that offends you, I can see it in your eyes. I know how it affects you. When they send it, they don't get that interaction back and forth. That's where we have a problem. They don't see them laugh, and they don't see them cry."

In order to deal with bullying, the behavior must first be defined, Utter said. To be considered bullying, a behavior must be intentional and meant to harm. It also must be repeated over a period of time.

"If one time you walk down a hallway and give a kid a shove, that's inappropriate. If every time you walk down the hallway, you give a kid a shove, that's bullying," he said.

To help prevent that behavior, there are many steps that can be taken, the two educators said.

First of all, it is important that parents monitor their own actions, Utter said.

"The loss of respect is our own fault in one way or another," he said. "I think in the last few years, we've had a lot of adults having adult conversations around their children. And they don't need to hear this stuff."

Utter said that parents should avoid making adult comments when children are present, and they should also not allow children to engage in disrespectful conversations in their presence.

Stulken added that it is essential that children trust their parents, as that trust will allow the lines of communication to remain open.

Byron Utter of the Midwest Center for School Safety discusses changes in bullying behavior brought on by newer technology. The presentation Monday night at Yankton Middle School covered how bullying has evolved, as well as how parents and schools can deal with the behavior.

"When they get garbage on their phone, the first thing they're going to do is delete it, because if they tell their parents, (it's going to be taken away)," he said. "Your kid has to trust you enough to come to you and say, 'Hey Dad, I don't know where this came from, but there's garbage on my phone.'"

Stulken said it is also wise for parents to take away cell phones and computer access at night, as a large percentage of students use them when their parents are sleeping and can't monitor their behavior.

While parents can take valuable steps to prevent bullying, it is also up to the schools, Stulken said.

He said it is necessary for schools to reteach students life

lessons, not just punish them.

"We can't just throw the bully out," he said. "We must reteach life skills to the third grade bully, to the sixth grade bully, to the ninth grade bully and so on. Otherwise, they grow up to be adult bullies."

Stulken added that better supervision is also needed during recess and lunch, in locker rooms, and on the bus.

While many of these suggestions will help stop bullying in schools, Utter said it must all begin with a change in attitude.

"We can't accept the idea that it's OK to do these things," he said. "We have to make the decision that we aren't going to stand for it anymore as adults."

Classic Silent Movie To Be Shown Sunday

The classic 1925 silent film "The Phantom of the Opera" is coming to Yankton at 7 p.m. Sunday, Oct. 30, at the United Church of Christ, Yankton.

The film is an American silent horror film adaptation of the Gaston Leroux novel of the same title directed by Rupert Julian.

The film features the actor Lon Chaney who haunts the Paris Opera house as the Phantom and his love for Christine Daae the beautiful singer of the Opera. The love between them will never happen much to the Phantom's regret and the story revolves around all the things that happen to them and the people around them.

Ted Powell, organist at The United Church of Christ-Congregational, will be providing the improvisation in accompanying the movie.

"I have always been intrigued by the artistry of the musicians that accompanied the great movies. It is difficult to draw themes and keep all the music in the right perspective," Powell said. "A good theatre organist should not overshadow the film or give anything away that is about to happen and then the biggest issue is not letting the improvisation get repetitive."

Powell also said that he is surprised by the special effects and the way that the film was created. "Now days we expect wonderful special computer enhanced special effects. There was none of this in 1925. The sheer magnitude of the creation of this film is very exciting to watch."

Powell will be performing on the 48 rank Yankton College Organ at the United Church of Christ-Congregational. Although the story is the same, the music differs from the Broadway story or more recent history.

The film is free to the public.
