trigger whenever he wanted to, she testified. The defense questioned why the woman didn't mention the sexual assaults when she was interviewed by investigators after Robert was arrested for kidnapping. "I told myself because I said 'fine' and rolled over that it wasn't rape," the woman said, adding that she has only recently accepted it. Defense attorneys objected to the woman's testimony as well as testimony from another woman Robert was charged with attempting to kidnap in 2005, but Zell allowed it, saying it went to the nature of Robert's character. Brianna St. Claire said she had just finished working a shift at a restaurant in Piedmont, S.D., on July 24, 2005, when Robert stopped her on the side of the road with flashing white lights. Robert, dressed in jeans and a t-shirt, told the 18-year-old he was an undercover police officer. Robert did not ask for a vehicle registration, which raised a red flag, St. Claire testified, but she followed his orders. When she asked for identification, Robert picked her up and put her in her trunk and said he was going to take her to Sturgis, said St. Claire, who has since married and goes by Brianna Kerner.

St. Claire used her cell phone to call police and tell them what was happening, and her car was found abandoned in a nearby residential area. Robert pleaded guilty to the kidnapping and said he was attempting to rob St. Claire. Robert was serving his sentence on the kidnapping charge when he attempted the failed escape with Berget. Berget, who has pleaded not guilty to the slaying, also faces the death penalty. His trial is scheduled to start Jan. 30. A third inmate, Michael J. Nordman, 47, was charged with supplying some of the items used in the killing. Prosecutors have not said whether they will seek the death penalty for Nordman. In 2007, Nordman told prison authorities Robert had tampered with a shower lock in another failed escape attempt, Tom Linneweber with the South Dakota State Penitentiary said Tuesday. Robert denied Nordman's claim, but he was ultimately found guilty of the violation. Officials say they have implemented several changes at the prison since the killing, including adding officers to three areas and installing additional security cameras. The National Institute of Corrections issued a favorable report on the penitentiary's response Tuesday, saying the changes were consistent with good security practices.

Landowners Must Remove Illegal Hay Bales

PIERRE — The South Dakota Department of Transportation reminds landowners that hay remaining in highway ditches after Oct. 1 is deemed illegal. Any person wishing to claim ownership of illegal bales must obtain a permit from the South Dakota Department of Transportation. Those permits are issued on a first-come, first-served basis and allow permit holders to take ownership of any illegal hay bales. Permits are available at DOT area offices in the following communities: Aberdeen, Belle Fourche, Custer, Huron, Mitchell, Mobridge, Pierre, Rapid City, Sioux Falls, Watertown, Winner and Yankton. The Department of Transportation will remove or authorize the removal of any hay bales remaining in the public right-of-way after Oct. 31. Wheat for December delivery fell 6.25 cents to \$6.3625 a bushel; December corn fell 0.25 cent to \$6.5075 a bushel; December oats fell 4.50 cents to \$3.3650 a bushel; while November soybeans fell 1.25 cent to \$12.2550 a bushel. Beef futures and pork futures also fell on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. December live cattle fell 0.90 cent to \$1.2197 a pound; November feeder cattle fell 1 cent to \$1.4180 a pound; while December lean hogs fell 0.97 cent to 87.85 cents a pound.
