## Free Vaccination Clinics Scheduled For Yankton School District Students

For the fifth year the South Dakota Department of Health is offering free seasonal flu vaccines for children aged 6 months through 18 years.

Influenza vaccination helps protect children from the flu and its complications and decreases the spread of influenza in the community, as children are often the biggest spreaders of the disease to adults and other children. During the 2010-11 flu season there were 292 flu-associated hospitalizations with 104 (35 percent) children at or below the age of 18. Of the confirmed (PCR or culture positive only) 492 of 860 (57 percent) were children at or below the age of 18. Most concerning, four of the 20 (20 percent) flu deaths last season were children. In fact, three were school age kids age 11, 14 and 16. Some children age 8 and younger will need two doses of flu vaccine this year.

- Children aged 6 months-8 years who did not receive any 2010-11 flu vaccine need 2 doses separated by four weeks.
- Children aged 6 months-8 years receiving seasonal flu vaccine for the first time need 2 doses of vaccine separated by four weeks.
- Children aged 6 months-8 years who received seasonal flu vaccine for the first time last year but only had 1 dose need 2 doses separated by four weeks.

Information will be handed out at the vaccination clinics regarding the date for the second dose clinic.

The state is supplying the vaccine free of charge, and there will be no administration fee at school-based clinics.

### ELEMENTARY SCHOOL STUDENTS

A free seasonal flu clinic will be held for children in Jr. Kindergarten through 5th grade at each elementary school. Parents need not be present but the attached consent form must be signed by a parent for all students wishing to get the vaccine in school. Please return these forms to your child's teacher or the school office by Monday, November 7. Below is the schedule for each elementary school.

- Lincoln School — Tuesday, Nov. 15: 8:45 a.m.-noon.
- Webster School — Tuesday, Nov. 15: 12:30-3 p.m.
- Stewart School — Wednesday, Nov. 16: 8:45 a.m.-noon.
- Beadle School — Wednesday, Nov. 16: 12:30-3 p.m.

### MIDDLE SCHOOL STUDENTS

A free seasonal flu clinic will be held for the middle school students between 8:45 a.m.-noon at the Yankton Middle School on Wednesday, Nov. 9. Parents need not be present but the attached consent form must be signed by a parent for all students wishing to get the vaccine in school. Return the consent form to the office by Wednesday, Nov. 3.

### HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

A free seasonal flu clinic for all high school students will be held between 8:45 a.m.-2 p.m. at the Yankton High School on Thursday, Nov. 10. Parents need not be present but the attached consent form must be signed by a parent for all students under the age of 18. Students age 18 and older may sign their own forms.

These clinics are being offered free of charge with no administration fee and are sponsored by the Avera Sacred Heart Pediatric Nurses, Yankton School District Nurses and Community Health Nurses. If you have any questions relating to the vaccine or the scheduled clinics, contact Lisa Hardy at the Pediatric Unit, 668-8507, or one of the Yankton School District Nurses.
