governments keep teachers on the job and pay the salaries of police officers, firefighters and other emergency services workers.

Saying the country cannot wait for Congress, Obama has begun bypassing Congress and taking steps on his own that he says will encourage economic growth.

On Friday, Obama directed government agencies to shorten the time it takes for federal research to turn into commercial products in the marketplace. The goal is to help startup companies and small businesses create jobs and expand their operations more quickly.

The president also called for creating a centralized online site for companies to easily find information about federal services. He previously had announced help for people who owe more on their mortgages than their homes are worth and for the repayment of student loans. The White House also challenged community health centers to hire veterans.

The congressional report, based on Internal Revenue Service and Census Bureau data, was released as the Occupy Wall Street movement spreading across the country protests bailouts for corporations and the income gap.

In the weekly GOP message, Illinois Rep. Bobby Schilling urged Obama to support bills that Republicans say would help create jobs by blocking various energy and environmental regulations and streamlining administrative procedures.

and did affect the marketing systems, so now we have all the forward marketing, which is what the NFO started. ... In 1982-83, I was asked to serve as interim executive director in Des Moines, Iowa. Which was interesting because I learned all the networking. I attended board meetings and the national soil conservation meeting in San Francisco. So I have a lot of experiences, but I am sure I got more out of it than I gave."

Kayser took what he learned with the NFO and from his experience as the Rural Life Director for the Dioceses of Sioux Falls — which he held for 17 years — and applied it to the SDPJC through 12 years of service on the board. Wilson said Kayser's service has played a part in all aspects of the organizations missions.

"We have been active against warfare because we believe in peaceful conflict resolution, and we have been active in the resolution to end oppression and encourage stewardship of resources," she said. "We believe that along with social justice and economic justice, which is important for a healthy society, that we also need environmental justice to have a prosperous life on this earth. We believe that it is important to aim for justice for all people — not just in the United States and South Dakota, but world wide.

"It is not just his environmental work. We also appreciate that he has dedicated so much time to the South Dakota Peace and Justice Center. He's had a lot of commitment and service to our group working for more than just the

environmental issues. They are all interrelated."

Kayser said one of the things he is most proud of recently is his involvement with the Emmaus House in Yankton

"Emmaus House has now been open for seven years and provides a place to stay for families of Springfield prison inmates and families of patients at Yankton's Human Services Center," he said. "It was a dream that we have realized and we have had a lot of guests from all over the country and state stay in the home."

He also said he is proud of his involvement in the work against the death penalty. Kayser was among the SDPJC members who kept vigil outside the penitentiary the night Elijah Page was executed and he said with last week's death sentence for Eric Robert in Sioux Falls, he is sure the group will focus on the issue again.

Throughout his years of service, Kayser has served all across South Dakota. He said he is sure he has pushed the limits sometimes in his homilies to his parishes, but he said it is all part of working toward equality for everyone.

"I learned what can happen when people get emotionally out of hand," he said in reference to a speech he gave at a farmer's meeting in Pierre in the 1980s. "A crowd of thousands just stood up and applauded. It was both frightening and energizing that I could touch all those people and influence them. It is a powerful message I never forgot."

Wilson said, his message has been used to reach many people, and that he is still actively working for others.

"Just last week we had the Occupy Vermillion and he came over," she said. "He is still out there helping others. That and his dedication through the years is why he was this year's Lifetime Achievement recipient."
