

**SDSU's Shafraeth Earns MVFC Honors**

ST. LOUIS — South Dakota State University linemaker Ross Shafraeth has been named Missouri Valley Football Conference Defensive Player of the Week after helping lead the Jackrabbits to their fourth consecutive victory.

A senior from Hampton, Iowa, Shafraeth recorded a team-high 12 tackles and intercepted a pair of passes as South Dakota State defeated Missouri State, 17-7, on Sept. 29. Named the Outstanding Player of the 46th Annual Beef Bowl, Shafraeth also broke up a pass. His two interceptions were half of the four Jackrabbit picks on the day.

Shafraeth has led the Jackrabbits in tackles all five games this season en route to a team-best 57 stops. He has tallied double figures in tackles four times this season and six of the team's last eight games dating back to 2011.

The nationally ranked Jackrabbits, 4-1 overall and 2-0 in league play, resume play Oct. 13 by hosting Western Illinois.

with two kills — finishing with a match-high 34 kills.

“We can’t get too down. We had our chances to win, which is pretty frustrating.” USD junior Amber Aschoff, owner of 12 kills, said. “I guess it’s good that it stings, because it’ll help us in the future.”

Optimism like that was a common sight after Saturday’s loss, because as Houk pointed out, it wasn’t as if the Coyotes came out flat — though they did drop set one 15-25.

“The girls seemed pretty optimistic, even after a tough one like that,” he said. “When you’re playing well, you don’t put the bus in reverse. We’ve got high expectations around here, so we’ll keep doing what we’re doing.”

Part of what was working Saturday was a balanced offense. Senior Kim Bulaga led with 16 kills on 48 swings, while Aschoff followed with 12 on 46 swings, and leading hitter Kendall Krittenbrink had 10 kills on 41 attempts.

For good measure, sophomore

middles Melissa Firtko and freshman Kelsey Biltfoft added nine and eight kills, respectively.

“We’re obviously trying to spread the offense around, so teams don’t focus on just one person,” Aschoff said. “We still have to do a lot better.”

That effort continues next weekend when the Coyotes hit the road for a Friday match at North Dakota State and Saturday at South Dakota State.

“That’d be a good weekend to turn it around, wouldn’t it?” Houk asked rhetorically. “What a great opportunity for us. NDSU still has that aura of being untouchable, but we’re confident.”

North Dakota State, the two-time defending league champion and pre-season No. 1, currently sits in eighth place at 2-4. South Dakota State, meanwhile, is third in the league race at 4-2.

“We always have fun at Brookings,” Aschoff said with a smile. “We know it’ll be a fight, but we’re up to it. It’s for the pride of our state.”

“It’s just all about working out the kinks so we can win.”

thing that happens very often in the DakotaDome.

“It’s tough to win on the road anywhere in college football, and we warned our players of that,” ISU coach Brock Spack said. “They’re used to winning here, it was tough.”
