Trial Moved And Delayed For Murder Suspect

TYNDALL (AP) — Trial for a South Dakota man accused of killing his infant son has been moved out of Bon Homme County and delayed by a couple of months.

Thirty-eight-year-old Chris Miller is accused of killing 4-month-old Jacob in March 2011 by shaking and beating the child. He has pleaded not guilty to murder and other charges and was to stand trial in Tyndall beginning Oct. 29.

Miller asked earlier this fall that the trial be moved. The Daily Republic newspaper reports that Judge Glen Eng has moved the trial to the Turner County Courthouse in Parker and delayed it until January.

The trial is expected to last more than two weeks.

- The first annual Gurney-Yankton Fall Festival, successor to the House of Gurney Fall Festival and known throughout the northwest as "The Pancake Days" opened in Yankton this morning and will continue throughout the week. Including a Sunday program at the House of Gurney.

50 YEARS AGO

Friday, October 5, 1962

- The second Oral Polio Clinic will be held on Sunday, October 7 at the Tyndall auditorium from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. Type 2 of the oral vaccine will be administered to everyone from three months of age to 65 years of age. Everyone is urged to receive the second dose in order to complete the series and maintain proper immunization.

A fee of 25 cents will be collected to cover the cost of the vaccine.

25 YEARS AGO

Monday, October 5, 1987

- For the second time in six months, several units of a Burlington Northern freight train derailed near Mission Hill. The derailment occurred at about 1:30 p.m. Sunday just east of the WNAX towers along Old Highway 50. The 61-car train was east-bound from Mitchell to Sioux City, when a broken rail caused five cars to jump the tracks.
- Paced by "Johnson and Johnson" the Yankton cross country team ran quite well in the Lennox Tri-State Invitational cross country meet on Saturday. In the boys varsity race, Kent Johnson sped to a personal best time of 15:53 to take fourth place while Butch Johnson also grabbed a medal place with a personal best time of 17:11, good for 15th.

BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures mostly rose Thursday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for December delivery fell 3.75 cents to \$8.6925 a bushel; December corn added 0.25 cent to \$7.57 a bushel; December oats rose 7.50 cents to \$3.7075 a bushel; while November soybeans jumped 19.75 cents

to \$15.5150 a bushel.

Beef futures fell and pork futures rose on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

December live cattle fell 0.32 cent to \$1.2570 a pound; November feeder cattle fell 0.98 cent to \$1.4582 a pound; while December lean hogs rose 0.18 cent to 76.05 cents a pound.

Drought

U.S. Department of Agriculture reported. Some 56 percent of the corn crop in Iowa has been harvested, while Illinois has brought in 71 percent and Missouri 88 percent.

Half of the U.S. corn crop is classified as being in poor or very poor shape, essentially unchanged from a week earlier, the USDA said. A year ago, 20 percent of corn in the fields was listed that way.

Forty-one percent of the U.S. soybean crops have been harvested — double the pace of the average of the previous half decade — with one-third considered poor or very poor, the USDA said.

The USDA reported Monday that emergence of winter wheat was lagging, given the extremely dry conditions that could keep that rotational crop from properly germinating. Just five percent of that crop had emerged in South Dakota, down sharply from 32 percent over the previous five years. Similar issues were reported in Nebraska, Colorado, Montana and Oregon.
