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They're smart, calculating and perceptive — with a little luck on their side.

They're the best cribbage players in the nation, and in 2015, they'll have their eyes set on Yankton, as the city was recently chosen as the site for the 34th annual American Cribbage Congress (ACC) Grand National Tournament.

"It's very exciting to bring the event to Yankton," said Scott Kooistra of Yankton, who submitted the bid to host the tournament and

will serve as its director. 'We've had regional tournaments here, but this is the grand national championship." The ACC is a nonprofit or-

ganization dedicated to making the game of cribbage fun and fair for people of all ages,

according to the group's website. It sponsors more than 150 sanctioned tournaments each year throughout North America, and its Grand National Tournament draws more than 300 players from more than 30 states

While the tournament is typically held in much larger cities (the tournament will be in Atlanta in 2013 and in Phoenix in 2014), Kooistra said he felt confident that Yankton would be a good fit.

"I think there's just something about the friendli-ness and the charm of a smaller community," he said.

Kooistra, a cribbage enthusiast who has directed several cribbage tournaments in the past including the Grand National, worked with the Yankton Convention and Visitor's Bureau to submit the bid.

'We know that one of the things that can be hard when trying to get a national event for Yankton is we don't have a major airport," said the bureau's director Lisa Scheve. "Since there is going to be a little bit more expense to an attendee, we wanted to make sure if we were going to get this tournament, it would be cost-effective, so we put together some incentives.'

In their submitted bid, Kooistra and Scheve also pointed out the success of tournaments held in Yankton in the past, such as previous national and international archery tournaments and regional cribbage tournaments.

Kooistra said he believed the city's track record with such events, along with his own experience, is what ultimately put Yankton over the top to receive the tournament.

When this was being decided, a lot of people spoke up about both myself as a tournament director, as well as about Yankton and the facilities we have as being

very friendly and low-cost," Kooistra said. The 2015 ACC Grand National Tournament will be held Sept. 17-20, 2015, at the Best Western Kelly Inn. Along with the Grand National, the event will feature seven additional side tourna-

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ments, as well as an awards banquet and board of directors functions.

Kooistra called the tournament a "unique, yet competitive atmosphere" for its partici-

pants. "I've played in smaller chess tournaments, and there isn't a lot of laughing and joking," he said. "The one neat thing about cribbage is you can play the game and have fun, too.'

While Yankton's selection as the tournament host is exciting for cribbage players, Scheve said the event should also give Yankton's economy a healthy boost during that weekend.

Things like this benefit the entire community," she said. "When you bring in over 300 people, they have to stay somewhere, and they have to use the services in the community."

Although the tournament won't arrive in Yankton until 2015, Kooistra said preparation will begin soon, and he hopes to get help from a local cribbage club he plans on forming next year. Kooistra said with support from the community, he is sure the Grand National tournament will be a success

'The facilities are great, and the town is great," he said. "I told them at the meeting, 'We can't build an airport in three years, but we can do just about everything else.
