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USD is now seeking approval of a \$10.6 million Science, Health and Research Lab facility that will accommodate the needs of Occupational Therapy, Physical Therapy, Physician's Assistant, and Kinesiology and Sports Sciences (KSS) pro-

Both USD and Sanford Health which made a \$20 million donation toward athletic facilities in August - see those programs as an area of growth in the near future, Sayler

"That research tie is huge," he said. "It is definitely something Sanford was looking to partner with us on. It's really worked out

exactly how we'd hoped. We couldn't be more excited for the future."

Because the funding for the two projects would come from different sources, USD had to submit them as separate entities, Sayler

Funding for the \$48 million arena and track/soccer complex will come from cash donations of \$14.15 million, a pledge from the USD Foundation for \$9.9 million, athletic revenues of \$3.4 million and \$20.6 million from debt financing (portion of Sanford gift, rental agreements and corporate sponsorships).

Sayler said his department has raised a "substantial amount of money" so far, but seeks an additional \$12 million from a variety of avenues over the next 6-8 months.

"That's my challenge to our staff," he said. "Our foundation is fully supportive of the project, but I still have to go out and seek the pledges to support their portion. Before a shovel is in the ground, they want to make sure we have the money.'

In terms of the proposed lab facility, funding for that project will come from \$8.7 million from the Higher Education Facilities Fund and \$1.9 million in donations.

Relocating the health sciences and ultimately moving the nursing program out of Julian Hall would allow USD to begin removal of both Julian Hall and Noteboom Hall from the building inventory. That would erase \$9 million from deferred maintenance.

Put another way, Sayler said he hopes the Regents OK the funding sources and allow USD to move forward in its goals. The next step would be presenting the proposals to the South Dakota state Legislature in January.

"What we're trying to shoot for is that if we have the funding in place for any one of the three, we could start building," Sayler said. You might see the lab done before the arena, if we have the funds available.

"Right now, it's all about getting down the proper channels.

First things first: USD will make its presentation to the Regents' Committee on Budget and Finance at 3:30 p.m. Wednesday at the Muenster Center Ballroom. Sayler said each side will go over the details with a "fine-toothed comb" and ensure that everyone clearly understands the funding sources.

Though there are a lot of numbers, figures and schematics surrounding the projects, Sayler said when it comes to talking with potential donors, the message is rather simple.

There seems to be this percep-

tion that this hurdle is hard to get through, but our job is looking across the table and saying to people, 'Sign this piece of paper and we can move forward," he said.

Beyond the health and conditioning aspects of the projects, the involved athletic teams (basketball and volleyball) will obviously benefit from a new arena. Sports like football, indoor track, and swimming and diving would remain in the DakotaDome (which will undergo renovations following the arena project), while soccer would have a new home.

Outdoor track and field, however, is one sport that would perhaps benefit the most. Those athletes regularly travel to Yankton to train and practice at Williams Field, which causes scheduling conflicts. The pricetag of \$4 million for that project might be the one reached first, Sayler said.

"Track itself has raised specific donors because of the dollars being smaller, so that might start first. That could be done before everything else," he said. "There are a lot of people interested. And we all know that facility could really put us over the top, regionally

and nationally."

For now, both in preparation for and following the presentation to the Regents, USD has tried to sustain the momentum for the athletic facility projects following the lead gift from Sanford Health, Sayler said.

"Everyone's anxious, and that's good," he said. "It drives me and our fundraising staff."


