CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures traded mixed Monday on the Chicago Board of Trade. Wheat for December delivery rose 3.50 cents to \$8.61 a bushel; December corn fell 6 cents to \$7.42 a bushel; December oats rose 3.25 cents to \$3.7050 a bushel; while November soybeans slipped 0.50 cent to \$15.51 a bushel. Beef futures fell and pork futures rose on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. December live cattle rose 0.20 cent to \$1.2640 a pound; November feeder cattle added 0.10 cent to \$1.4630 a pound; while December lean hogs rose 0.32 cent to 76.87 cents a pound.

**75 YEARS AGO**  
**Saturday, October 9, 1937**  
• Postmaster-General James A. Farley will be in Yankton briefly Monday morning en route north. A large delegation of local people, including the high school band and the V.F.W. drum corps, will be at the Milwaukee station to greet the cabinet officer during the 15 minutes he will be here, between 10:05 and 10:20 a.m.  
• A large number of Yankton hunters took the field this morning, some going out to get located for the afternoon pheasant shooting which opens at noon for four half days in the season, but mostly for ducks and other migratory water fowl, the season on which opened at 7 o'clock this morning.

**50 YEARS AGO**  
**Tuesday, October 9, 1962**  
• Charted figures picturing Yankton High School's future needs as based on projected enrollments and existing classroom space were presented to the Board of Education at its October meeting Monday night. The figures prepared and presented by Dr. Clair T. Blikre, superintendent, and Principal Kenneth Henseler clearly alerted the district to be "ready with additional school facilities by the start of the 1964-65 school year." An enrollment of 610 students is expected at that time.  
• Approximately 400 women were in attendance at the Best of all Days cooking school sponsored by the Tyndall Tribune and Register at the Tyndall auditorium last Tuesday afternoon, Oct. 2. In charge of the demonstrations were two Dakota Magazine home economists, Miss Jan Palmquist of Minneapolis and Mrs. Don Fox of Clear Lake.

**25 YEARS AGO**  
**Friday, October 9, 1987**  
• With senior Sarah Mannes heading the charge, the Yankton Gazelles bounded by Sioux Falls O'Gorman 57-44 in a non-conference victory Thursday night that erased any doubts about the Gazelles' ability to overcome defeat.  
• The Cockatoo Bar is the latest Yankton business to be damaged by fire. The Yankton Volunteer Fire Department responded to a fire at the downtown Yankton bar, 110 E. Third St., at 4:57 a.m. today after a report of smoke was phoned in by a policeman on patrol. "We were hit by flames when we got there," department spokesman Don Buehrer said. "But we had the fire out within half an hour."
