Daugaard Declares Oct. As Cyber Security **Awareness Month**

PIERRE — In partnership with the South Dakota Bureau of Information and Telecommunications (BIT), Gov. Dennis Daugaard has declared October as Cyber Security Awareness Month in South Dakota.

Today, we are more connected than ever before through the Internet. Citizens, schools, libraries, businesses, governments and other organizations use the Internet for a variety of tasks every day to stay connected with family and friends, manage financial records, conduct research, apply for jobs and student loans, provide educational opportunities, perform business operations and more. While each of these creates efficiencies in our daily lives, the connectivity has also increased the ways of heightening online security.

'Maintaining the security of cyberspace is a shared responsibility in which each of us has a critical role," stated David Zolnowsky, BIT Commissioner. "As the state's leader in information and technology, we will continue to provide awareness and education on cyber security in an effort to improve the security of South Dakota's technology infrastructure.

Internet users and South Dakota's information and technology infrastructure face an increased threat of malicious cyber-attacks, loss of privacy from spyware and significant financial and personal privacy losses due to identity theft and fraud. How can users and government employees stay safe online? Here are helpful tips to practice:

• Sharing passwords or

phrases only hurts the user. Keep this information private and do not share it with co-workers or colleagues.

 For your protection, do not write passwords down on small pieces of paper or tape them to your computer. Also, remember to change your passwords regu-

• Think about using a pass phrase instead of a password. Substitute similar symbols for characters: !luVf!s^ = I love fish.

• Access to "free" wireless networks is easy and convenient to use. However, be careful and only use encrypted wireless networks as they offer higher levels of protection.

• Avoid "free" downloads for screensavers, surveys or online club registrations as they can include hidden spyware programs.

• Reboot your computer at least once a month.

• Research shows that email attachments remain the primary means by which worms and viruses propagate. Opening attachments from unknown sources is not smart.

• If you receive an email asking for your account credentials (account name and password), delete it immediately. By responding, you can easily put your identity in jeopardy and may become a victim of identity theft.

Donald Moeller, 60, is expected to be put to death in the week beginning Oct. 28. Moeller was convicted in the 1990 kidnapping, rape and murder of 9-yearold Becky O'Connell.

Moeller's last legal hurdle lies with a federal judge who's been asked to determine whether the state's one-drug capital punishment procedure is constitutional.

Moeller's federal attorneys, in a July filing, said they were seeking information on how the state is obtaining its supply of pentobarbital, whether it's from an FDA-approved company, how the drug is stored and how it's delivered. A decision in that case is pending, but Moeller last week told U.S. District Court Judge Lawrence Piersol that he wants

"I killed. I deserve to be killed," he said in court.

Moeller on Tuesday wrote Piersol a letter from prison asking that the case be dismissed. Moeller's attorneys say he's incompetent and incapable of making voluntary and rational decisions and want to press forward with arguments in the case.




