Gazelles Sweep At Yankton JV Invite

The Yankton Gazelles claimed the top four spots and five of the top six spots in the JV girls race at the 33rd annual Yankton Junior Varsity Invitational cross country meet, held on Tuesday at the HSC Course.

All of Tuesday's races were 4,000 meters. Tessa Folkers (17:04.32), Madison McClure (17.09.60) and Holly Hicks $(17.14.18)\ led$ a Yankton seventh grade sweep of the JV girls' race, with junior Abbey Van Meeteren (17:28.29) finishing fourth. After Crofton junior Jazmin Wubben (17:28.90) broke up the top-five sweep, Gazelles eighth grader Kristen Rezac placed sixth in 17:47.84.

Yankton put seven runners in the top 11 in the JV boys' race. O'Gorman junior Kinard Sproles won in 14:33.32, just under four seconds ahead of Yankton junior Silas Juricek (14:37.01). Also in the lead pack for Yankton were Sam Gusso (14:40.39) in third. Paul Fanta (14:53.99) in fifth. Ethan Klimisch (15:08.31) in eighth, Kyle Bergeson (15:08.65) in ninth, Morgan Hill (15:08.89) in 10th and Lincoln Megard (15:09.57) in 11th.

Crofton seventh grader Haley Arens ran away with the middle school girls' race, clocking a 17:10.67 to finish nearly a minute ahead of Yankton eighth grader Alexis Rezac (18:07.87)

Norfolk's Aaron Metcalf clocked á 15:21.35 to win the middle school boys' race, 25 seconds ahead of Yankton's Isaac Schulz. The Bucks' Brady finished third, with teammate (GG.11:01) IIIIPpa Hunter Lippert (16:28.88) fifth.

The meet marked the end of the home season for Yankton, which takes its varsity and JV to Brandon on Thursday for a triangular with the Lynx and Mitchell, the final meet before state.

Coyotes Expect 'Tough One' Against Winless Missouri State

Something will have to give. The University of South Dakota hasn't won a game away from Vermillion in two seasons, while Missouri State is 2-15 in its last 17 games dating back to the start of the 2011 sea-

Each team has struggled this year, as well, and will look to turn the tides when they meet Saturday in a Missouri Valley Football Conference showdown in Springfield, Mo.

Coming off a seven-point loss to Western Illinois, the Coyotes (1-4, 0-2) have given themselves plenty to work on entering their first Valley road game. Tops among those? Mis-

"We've got to make plays when

we have a chance," head coach Joe Glenn said Tuesday during a media teleconference. "We had a handful of missed passes, and that hasn't been a part of our MO, and had another punt blocked. Anybody in this business knows that if you get a punt blocked you usually don't win the

"It changes the momentum, and that's exactly what it did."

Missouri State (0-6, 0-3) hasn't found much in the way of momentum to build from, though the Bears have been competitive. MSU ranks third in the Valley in passing offense with 236.5 yards per game, but hasn't turned that production into points — ranking last at 11.5 points per game.

As has been the case with USD, turnovers have been a key factor for

the Bears. In its four FCS games, Missouri State has a turnover margin of minus-seven (15 turnovers to eight takeaways).

The Bears, who played a pair of top-25 FBS schools, have lost their three conference games by an average of 10.6 points.

They're very capable. They've had a very tough schedule, and they've been close and competitive,' Glenn said. "Their defense is playing, in my opinion, very well. They haven't given up many points.

"I can see where they're just getting better every week and it'll be a tough one."

In that way, Saturday's matchup is even closer. The Coyotes dropped their league opener to Illinois State by three points and came up short, 24-17, to Western Illinois.

"We're pretty similar to South Dakota, so it should be a great football game," MSU coach Terry Allen said. "Both teams are struggling to get victories, but each one has been in their games."


Turnovers have specifically haunted Missouri State. Junior quarterback Ashton Glaser is statistically among the league's best at 1,159 yards, but has completed just 109-of-203 passes and has thrown 12 interceptions — to just two touchdowns.

He was replaced after halftime of last week's game at Indiana State by sophomore back-up Kierra Harris, who responded with a 12-of-15 effort for 131 yards.

And yes, Missouri State plans to keep the two-quarterback system,

Yankton was a few points shy of earning a thrilling five-set victory against Brandon Valley on Tuesday night.

The Gazelles were within three points getting swept before rallying at the Summit Center. Brandon Valley escaped with the Eastern Dakota Conference victory, however, after getting clutch kills from Allison Koehn and Emme Sumner — mixed in with a few Yankton hitting errors — to take the fifth set and the match.

"I feel like we missed on a couple of our shots by inches and it's a game of inches," Yankton coach Leasa Woodward said after the Gazelles' 25-21, 26-24, 22-25, 16-25, 15-12 setback. "There's a lot of

There's a plenty of things Woodward and the Gazelles can look at as positive and negatives after falling to the Lynx for the second time this season. The bright spot is the rally, something that Woodward said showed that her team has "a lot of guts."

CINCINNATI (AP) — Homer Bailey turned in a pitching performance worthy of a series clincher. Too bad for the Cincinnati starter that the Reds' bats and defense didn't follow

Bailey flirted with his second nohitter in his last three starts, but the San Francisco Giants got just enough good pitching of their own and capitalized on a key mistake to beat the Reds 2-1 in 10 innings Tuesday night, cutting their NL division series deficit to 2-1.

Third baseman Scott Rolen's twoout error in the 10th helped the Giants avoid a sweep.

Bailey, who threw his first career no-hitter on Sept. 28 at Pittsburgh, held San Francisco hitless until Marco Scutaro lined a clean single to right with two outs in the sixth inning.

"Fastball, location," Bailey said when asked what was working. "We executed everything.

Bailey said he had better stuff than he used to hold the Pirates hitless. Manager Dusty Baker, who missed that performance while still recovering from treatment for an irregular heartbeat, appreciated his second chance to see Bailey excel.

"Homer was lights out," Baker said. "That's the best I've seen Homer. I didn't see his no-hitter.'

Catcher Ryan Hanigan wasn't surprised by Bailey's effort.

"He's had good stuff the whole month, really," Hanigan said. "He threw great, no doubt about it. He made pitches all night. He didn't miss middle, and when he fell behind, he came back.'

Rolen, an eight-time Gold Glove winner, couldn't come up with Joaquin Arias' short-hop grounder, bobbled it and threw late to first. The loss extended the Reds' 17-year streak of home postseason frustra-

The Giants managed only three hits against Bailey and three Reds relievers, but got two of them in the 10th — along with a passed ball by Ryan Hanigan — to pull it out.




