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Yankton Teams Head West For State Soccer Gazelles Hope To Continue Surge | No. 3 Bucks Boast Scoring Punch

After an up-and-down season that saw the Yankton Gazelles girls' soccer squad go winless in seven straight matches, they find themselves right where they'd hoped to be all along. Headed to Rapid City for the

State Cup with confidence that they can make some noise.

Yankton takes the eighth seed into today's (Thursday) opening round, facing top-seeded Sioux Falls Roosevelt in the 5:30 p.m. (Central) match at Sioux Park. While the team has the low seed in the event, coach Dave La-Combe is confident in the progress the Gazelles made throughout the season.

"We have grown a lot since

our first game," he said. "They've developed into a team that wil be very competitive at the state tournament.

The Gazelles played a good chunk of the season without sen-ior goalkeeper Katie Greeneway, sending sophomore Raquel Cole into the fire in her first season on varsity.

"Raquel did well," LaCombe said. "Once Katie came back, it took some time to get back in the groove.'

Greeneway preserved a shutout in her second match back, but the Gazelles were blanked themselves by Spearfish. Three matches later, Yankton broke through with its first victory since the opener, a

As coach Warren Brenner watched the Yankton Bucks boys' soccer team work through the paces of a tough opening practice, he had a feeling that the Bucks were going to have a good season

A 7-2-1 record later, Brenner feels even better.

Yankton takes the third seed into the South Dakota State Soccer Association State Cup, which begins today (Thursday) in Rapid City. The Bucks tied Sioux Falls Lincoln in the standings, but lost the second seed on goal differential.

When we first did conditioning this fall was the first time I saw what they were capable of

The Mount Marty women's soccer team couldn't crack Morningside's tough defense.

Although the Lancers spent many minutes possessing the ball during Wednesday afternoon's Great Plains Athletic Conference matchup at Easton Field, Mount Marty failed to convert any of its 10 shots on goal against a Mustang defense that earned its third straight shutout with a 3-0 victory.

Mount Marty suffered its second straight home setback after being outshot 29-10. Morningside's defense had a lot to do with limiting the Lancers (4-9, 1-5 GPAC) scoring chances. Perfectly placed Mustang defenders kept Mount Marty from getting close, uncontested looks or from making the simple passes to establish an offensive rhythm.

"In the first and the second half, we definitely had some opportunities. We've got to finish," Mount Marty coach Nathan Epp said. "When you don't score goals, the team just keeps getting flatter and flatter. Scoring goals gives everybody an energy boost.'

Morningside knows that. After playing to scoreless ties with Northwestern and Hastings last week, the Mustangs (6-4-4, 2-2-2 GPAC) finally found some offense against the second-to-last team in the 11-member conference. Morningside got the game's first goal in the 13th minute when Amy Samuelson took a pass from Kelsey Niles and beat Mount Marty goalie Jennifer Nelson oneon-one.

The advantage remained at 1-0

well throughout the year," Morningside coach Tom Maxon said. "It's good to finish off some of those things because the girls were lacking in some confidence. When you have a lot of chances on goal and you don't put them away, you start trying to figure where your scoring is going to come from."

Maxon knew Mount Marty would look to Allison Erwin and Jennifer Granflaten – a former Yankton High School standout to lead the Lancers offense. The two freshmen each finished with four shots on goal but were ultimately left frustrated after not being able to beat Morningside goalie Felicia Reimann, who had six saves, or find teammates streaking to the goal.

"No. 15 (Erwin) and No. 8 (Granflaten) are both very, very good players," Maxon said. "So what we tried to do is not just defend well but attack enough so that their back group couldn't support their front group. So a lot of times that left No. 8 and 15 on their own. We were able to luckily snuff it out a few times."

Playing with a steady south wind at their backs in the second half, the Mustangs possessed the ball more yet failed to finish scoring opportunities. The constant pressure, however, on Mount Marty's defenders and Nelson, who recorded 12 saves in a little over 82 minutes of play, eventually resulted in Turner and Gonka putting the game out of reach.

The Lancers, who travel to Nebraska Wesleyan on Saturday, dropped to 1-6 in home matches this season.



On a team that already returned its key runners, Parker gained the addition this year of Vollmer, a transfer from Irene-Wakonda. Ryan Olson called Vollmer's transfer "one of the sweetest moments of the year."

"It's actually a big relief,"

Olson said. "I don't feel like they're (Irene-Wakonda) always on your back now. We run now knowing there aren't too many worries.

New USD Facilities One Step Closer To Reality

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With approval from the state Board of Regents in hand, the University of South Dakota is one step closer toward an overhaul of athletic facilities in Vermillion, athletic director David Sayler said Wednesday night.

The regents on Wednesday approved USD's plans that calls for \$48 million for a basketball/volleyball arena and track/soccer complex, as well as a \$10.6 million Science, Health and Research Lab connector facility.

"All of the things we brought forward were moved on to the next phase," Sayler said. "We really appreciate the regents' support, letting us taking that next step toward getting this all done.

"All in all, it was a good day." A bulk of Wednesday afternoon's presentation in Vermillion centered around how USD would fund the two projects, Sayler said.

The arena and track/soccer project will come from \$14 million in cash donations, a \$9.9 million pledge from the USD Foundation, \$3.4 million in athletic revenues and \$20.6 million in debt financing.
