After back-to-back losses to a pair of Sioux Falls squads, the Yankton Bucks look to get back on track tonight in their final home game of the regular season, an Eastern South Dakota Conference battle against the winless Mitchell Kernels at Crane-Youngworth

Following a Sept. 28 road defeat where they hung with Roosevelt throughout the contest, the Bucks suf-fered an ugly 52-8 loss against top-ranked Washington last week at home.

For a team looking to get back into the groove they experienced while riding a five-game winning streak to open the season, the 0-7 Kernels come to town at the opportune time for the 5-2 Bucks.

Yankton head coach Arlin Likness wants to see his team return to the opportunistic Bucks that forced 17 turnovers while only giving the ball away three times during their 5-0 start.

"We've lost the turnover battle the last two weeks," Likness said. "We need

to start winning it again." A possible ESD title is also still on the line assuming the Bucks can handle Mitchell and undefeated Brandon Valley defeats Pierre. Both the Lynx and the Bucks are 5-0 in conference play and are set to duel in Brandon in the regular season finale next Thursday.

"Our number one goal for Friday is that it's an ESD game," Likness added. "In order to win the conference we have to win this game.' The Kernels visit Yankton following

a 56-0 blowout loss to Lincoln at

Howard Wood Field last Friday. Mitchell has played a pair of close games this season, but has mostly struggled, while allowing their opponents to score 37.8 points per game.

"There is no doubt that we have taken our share of thumpings," Kernels head coach Kent VanOverschelde said. We came in with an inexperienced and youthful combination on both sides of the football."

That is good news for a Yankton offense that has put up at least 30 points on three serrate occasions against ESD schools, including a high of 44 against Watertown in their home-opening shutout of the Arrows back on September 7.

Mitchell is also only scoring an aver-

WAUSA, Neb. — The Crofton Lady Warriors put themselves in position for a run at a seventh consecutive Class D cross country title by doing what they do best.

Taking the focus off the big picture. Crofton outdistanced a solid Ainsworth program to win the girls' team title at the District D-4 Cross Country Meet on Thursday at Rolling Hills Country Club. Ainsworth, the top-ranked boys' team in Class D, flipped the script in the boys' race, beating out the Warriors for the crown.

Crofton senior Danielle Riesberg ran an easy race in leading the Lady Warriors to the region title. She clocked a 15:31 over the 4,000-meter course to finish nine seconds ahead of teammate Quinn Wragge. Winside's Mackenzie Gray finished third at 15:43.

The coaches had us back off our times a little," Riesberg said of the race. "It was so nice that we just ran here last week, so I knew what my splits were supposed to be. It was definitely an advantage."

Even though Riesberg did not go out as hard as last Friday's win in the Bloomfield Invitational, she still finished eight seconds faster. Wragge also finished eight seconds faster, moving up four spots from a week ago

"Quinn really picked it up," said Crofton head coach Jayne Arens. "Kendy Kube (6th, 15:56) and Vanessa McFarland (7th, 16:03) were right in there. Tiffany Tramp (10th, 16:24) had an off day, but she's been injured.

"One of the nice things about our team is that they all bring each other

up." Senior Abigail Braun also finished in the top 15 for Crofton, placing 11th in 16:37. Coach Arens said that the team could have put more runners in the top 15, had they been allowed to enter more than six. 'We have other girls that, if those girls could have run, they would have been in the top 15," she said. "They pushed each other along. It's a team effort, JV to varsity.' Bloomfield junior Breana Gallup finished fourth in 15:45 to earn a state berth. Laurel-Concord-Coleridge put two runners in the top 15, Sadie Petersen (9th, 16:17) and Samantha Camenzind (13th, 16:44). Crofton finished with 16 points, well ahead of Ainsworth (51). West Holt finished a close third for the other team spot out of the district.

The hometown Lynx won the girls' title 27-28, while the Brandon Valley boys won 24-37 over Yankton.

Yankton went 1-2 in the girls' race, highlighted by individual champion Savannah Woods with a time of 14:46.

The Giants won the final three games, all in Cincinnati, and advanced to the NL championship series. They will face either St. Louis or Washington.

Ahead 6-0, San Francisco saw the Reds rally throughout the late innings. Cincinnati scored once in the ninth before Sergio Romo struck out Scott Rolen with two runners on base to end it.

NATIONALS 2, CARDINALS 1: WASHINGTON The Washington Nationals signed Jayson Werth to show them how to win. His game-ending homer Thursday night extended their surprising season.

Werth led off the bottom of the ninth inning by driving Lance Lynn's 13th pitch into the left-field stands to give the Nationals a 2-1 victory over the defending World Series champion St. Louis Cardinals and force a Game 5 in their NL division series.

As he circled the bases, Werth raised his right index finger in a "No. 1" gesture, while the announced crowd of 44,392 roared with delight.

The best-of-five series will end Friday night in Washington, with the winner advancing to face the San Francisco Giants in the NL championship series.
