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VERMILLION — Nobody around the University of South Dakota football team is hiding the implications of today's (Saturday) game at Missouri State.

Simply put, the Coyotes can't afford another loss and an 0-3 start in the Missouri Valley Football Confer-

"This is a must-win for us," said head coach Joe Glenn, whose team sits 1-4 overall prior to today's 1 p.m. matchup with the winless Bears (0-6, 0-3). "You talk about two teams fighting it out to get a victory, we both need a win as bad as anybody in college football right

"We need a win; something to validate what you're doing," he added, following a long pause. "We need a win for our school, for Vermillion and for our state.'

Though hampered by mistakes through its first two league games, USD hasn't exactly been out of reach in either contest. The Coyotes lost by three to Illinois State and by a touchdown last week to Western Illinois — both at the DakotaDome.

Not much of a consolation, how-ever, said junior linebacker Tyler

"A loss is a loss; it's not a win," said Starr, fourth on the team in tackles with 34. "You could say we competed with those teams, but we know we're better than that. We're clearly not getting mistakes fixed, so it's on us as players to step up and make the right decision.'

Now, USD steps away from Vermillion and stares an 11-game road losing streak in the face. The Coyotes haven't won a road game since the 2010 upset of Minnesota — a span that includes three FBS

"One of our goals is to try to end this road streak," Starr said. "It'd be huge for us to get that done, get a win and start rolling.'

Aside from dropped passes, fumbles and penalties, the Coyotes have been biten by the big play over the last two weeks. First was a 79-yard go-ahead touchdown against Illinois State, then came a 66-yard go-ahead touchdown last

Asked if there have been any surprises so far in the MVFC, redshirt freshman Ryan Hillier pointed to the big-play potential on any

"You knew it was a really good conference, probably the best in the country," Hillier said. "We were just one play away. Coming in for films on Sunday and Monday, we could see that we were playing." could see that we were playing good, but that one play got us.

Today's opponent, Missouri State, may not boast the end result of many touchdowns (just seven total), but its offense has been able to move the ball. The Bears rank ast in the league in scoring (11.5) but are third in passing offense with 236.5 yards per game.

Missouri State uses much the same offensive scheme that Montana and Colgate used against the Coyotes, and with great success. Hillier said he expects to see the zone read, veer, spread-you-out style again today.

"Both of those other teams exposed us, so we think we need some redemption," Hillier said. "We need to prove that we can stop an offense like this when we see one.'

Taking away FBS losses to Kansas State and Louisville, Missouri State has a minus-seven turnover margin (15 turnovers to eight takeaways) in its four FCS games. Junior quarterback Ashton Glaser has thrown 12 interceptions, but was replaced in the second half last week by sophomore back-up Kierra Harris.

"There's no question, they're a good team," Glenn said. "They're a little bit like us. They've been snake-bitten with turnovers, but their defense is playing well."

In the case of the USD defense, it will see a shakeup in the secondary.

change, and get better."


IUPUI (14-7, 7-2) went back to their balanced offensive ways in the third set, recording 22 kills and just four errors in a 25-17 victory.

After a rash of injuries and consecutive losses derailed their undefeated season, Yankton went into Friday's game against Mitchell needing to find some rhythm and confidence, and most importantly, staying injury free. Mission accomplished.

A swarming defense led the Bucks (6-2, 6-0 ESD) to a 40-0 Eastern South Dakota Conference victory over the winless Kernels at Crane-Youngworth Field in a solid if unspectacular performance.

"There are still a lot of things we want to work on and need to improve at but after the last two weeks the best thing is we stayed healthy tonight," Bucks head coach

Yankton's defense held

Mitchell (0-8) to only 170 yards. If you take away a firstquarter 53-yard run by Kernel quarterback Matt Larson, Mitchell averaged only 2.5 vards per offensive play.

The Bucks defensive front completely shut down the Kernel running game, allowing only 94 yards on 36 carries with that 53-yard gain included while the Bucks rushed for 209 yards themselves on the same number of touches.

Along with stopping the Kernel rushing attack, Yankton's secondary only allowed Larson to pass for 76 yards on 5 for 12 passing while intercepting the Mitchell sophomore two times, one of those resulting in a 55-yard touchdown return by J.J. Hejna.

"When you get turnovers it gets everyone pumped up,' the junior said of his thirdquarter interception and

The Bucks had a plus-14 turnover ratio during the 5-0 start, but they had lost that battle in each of the past two


defeats.
