Marilyn Coulter was last seen at approximately noon on Tuesday in Yankton. She is described as 5 foot, 9 inches in height and weighs 224 pounds. She has brown hair and eyes; she recently cut her hair on the left side, making it uneven and noticeable. She is believed to be wearing a light-colored jacket, blue jeans and a pink shirt.

According to the Yankton Police Department, she is without needed medication and suffers from mental illness, which may cause her to become violent.

schedule for children to get vaccinated is recommended at 2 months old, 4 months, 6 months, 15-18 months, then again at 4-6 years old with a booster at 11 or 12.

The DOH provides both the vaccine and the booster free of charge

"The vaccination is the best protection against the cough," she said. "However, if you get sick, make sure to cover your cough or stay home from work or school."

Symptoms of the whooping cough include cold-like symptoms at first, but after a week or two they become more severe, including vomiting, fatigue and uncontrollable coughing. When infants are infected with the cough, it can lead to pneumonia, children becoming slow to stop breathing and even death.

Jan Johnson, who works with infection control at Avera Sacred Heart Hospital in Yankton, said she recommends that adults get the whooping cough booster.

"We have not seen many hospitalizations here because of the whooping cough," she said. "We also have not seen very many cases through our emergency department or the pediatric department here."

Winter recommends that if you or your child exhibits any symptoms of the cough to call your healthcare provider.

the national school lunch program and how they aren't getting enough to eat.

"I think it's yet another example of the federal government trying this one-size-fits-all approach ...," he said. "It's built on the assumption that every student is the same, and we know that's not the case. Some students are more active than others."

Smith added that he didn't want to be too critical of the program considering its goal is to fight childhood obesity, but questioned whether federal mandates are the best way to address the issue.

"I think we can address it in other ways that don't involve the heavy hand of government," he said. "And especially, we could address it with ways that are more flexible that address the needs of the students themselves."

When discussing agriculture, Smith talked about the Environmental

Protection Agency's (EPA) push to regulate farm dust, which he and Sen. Mike Johanns have fought against.

"It's been a big job trying to communicate to these folks what life is like out here," he said. "Yes we can survive, even with some dust. We shouldn't endanger our own livelihood by saying we're going to get rid of all farm dust."

Smith also touched on the status of the farm bill, which has yet to be brought to a vote in the House and won't be taken up until after the November elections. While he believes a compromise will be made, he said it could take some time, and it is important not to rush anything, because a failed vote in the House would send a bad message.

"I can get frustrated with the gridlock as much as anyone else," he said. "But if we in Washington always agreed on everything, and there weren't the checks and balances, it wouldn't be good. So I say that even as frustrated as all of us can be right now, we need to adhere to our system, our process."
