Suspect Shot, Trooper Injured In S.F. Car Chase

SIoux FALLS — An officer shot and wounded a woman early Wednesday after she ran over a South Dakota Highway Patrol trooper, critically injuring him, and then sped away, authorities said.
Neither the patrol nor the state attorney general's office released certain details about the incident, including the name of the suspect and the name and law enforcement agency of the officer who shot her.
Trooper Andrew Steen, 34, tried pulling the 25-year-old suspect's vehicle at around 2:30 a.m. on the west side of Sioux Falls, according to information from the Highway Patrol and state attorney general's office. The driver first drove into Steen's squad car and then into him, Patrol Capt. Kevin Joffer said.
"He was hit by the suspect's car and as a result he sustained injuries," Joffer said.
The suspect sped away and led law enforcement officers, including members of the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department, on a brief chase. An officer whom authorities

hadn't publicly identified shot the suspect, and she was apprehended less than a mile from the initial crash site.
Steen and the suspect were taken to a Sioux Falls hospital.
Joffer said Steen, an eight-year member of the Highway Patrol, was in critical but stable condition. Attorney General Marty Jackley said the suspect was wounded more than once. Her condition wasn't immediately made available. No charges have been filed in the case, said Joffer.
He said investigators are trying to reconstruct the scene of the crash. Initial reports were that Steen stopped the suspect because of erratic driving, but it's unclear if alcohol was involved.
"This is an ongoing investigation. We're trying to put all the pieces together and I don't want to jeopardize that investigation," Joffer said.
A shopping center and a city street were shut down early Wednesday as part of the crime scene. Sioux Falls police and state crime bureau agents were conducting the investigation.

Nebraska Wind Farm To Fire Up Soon

BROKEN BOW, Neb. (AP) — Developers expect to harvest enough power from a new wind energy project in central Nebraska farming and ranching country to meet the needs of about 25,000 homes.
Government, utility and company officials gathered Tuesday near Broken Bow to dedicate the Broken Bow Wind project, which was developed and will be run by Edison Mission Energy, of Santa Ana, Calif.
A brisk wind blew at the ceremony, prompting Edison Mission Energy President Pedro Pizarro to remark that Nebraska is a "really good wind resource," said The Grand Island Independent (http://bit.ly/T0vnYq).
The farm's 50 turbines stand more than 262 feet high and stretch across about 14,000 acres of central Nebraska fields. Commercial operation is expected to begin within weeks, generating up to 80 megawatts of electricity.
The electricity will be sold to Nebraska Public Power District under a 20-year contract.
NPPD President and CEO Pat Pope said the Broken Bow farm lets NPPD take "another major step forward in NPPD's strategic goal of having 10 percent of our energy

mix by 2020 to come from renewable energy sources."
NPPD will sell some of the contracted power to Omaha Public Power District, Lincoln Electric System and the city of Grand Island.
The plant is the third of Edison Mission's four Nebraska wind farms. The Crofton Bluffs project in Knox County is expected to begin operation by the end of 2012, Pizarro said.
The \$145 million Broken Bow project brought 100 construction jobs to the area and will create seven to 10 permanent jobs.
The plant also will generate an average of \$540,000 a year in lease royalties to landowners during its 25-year life.
Officials said a second phase for the Broken Bow farm would have produced an additional 75 megawatts, but that project has been put on hold pending the outcome of congressional negotiation of production tax credits that are scheduled to expire yet this year.
"We have not yet decided whether we can complete that part of the project," Pizarro said, but he said the first part was designed to connect to the second phase. "We've planned ahead."

Ex-Cop Settles In Privacy Claims Case

ST. PAUL, Minn. (AP) — A former police officer who accused other law enforcement of illegally accessing her driver's license information to see her photo has reached tentative settlements with St. Paul and other cities worth \$665,000.
Anne Marie Rasmusson, 38, alleged that 144 law enforcement officers "accessed, used or disclosed her private information approximately 554 times" between 2005 and 2012 "without any legitimate business reason to do so," according to the court records. She had named St. Paul, Minneapolis and 16 other area cities, among others, in a lawsuit.
A proposed settlement with St. Paul would give her \$385,000. The city council was set to vote on it Wednesday.
There's also a \$280,000 settlement reached during an Oct. 1 court ordered mediation session with the 16 cities. It will be paid by their insurer and also would cover current and potentially future individual officers or other departments involved, according to the city's attorney Jon Iverson.
Rasmusson's legal team is scheduled to have an additional settlement conference with the city of Minneapolis Oct. 25. They were unable to come to an agreement Oct. 1, Iverson said.
Rasmusson had lost 100 pounds while working in Eden Prairie, but had to retire in

2003 because of a back injury.
Rasmusson began to think law enforcement officers were taking an uncomfortable interest in her around 2007, the suit said.
She had recently divorced and became suspicious as to why and how some officers knew her address or the car she drove. So she checked with the state agency that tracks database inquiries.
One person who accessed the information was Eden Prairie Sgt. Carter Staaf, the suit says. He looked up Rasmusson's current driver's license along with her old ones to compare the photographs, the suit says.
Staaf encouraged his subordinates to conduct their own queries of Rasmusson's information because the lawsuit contends "she was very attractive and so they could see that 'she's changed and she's got a new look.'"
In the proposed settlement, St. Paul does not admit any wrongdoing but agrees to remove Rasmusson's name, picture, address and any other personal information from the city and police department's internal directory, intranet and website.
St. Paul City Attorney Sara Grewing said statutes call for minimum damages of \$2,500 per unauthorized check. With a total of 228 St. Paul lookups alleged in the suit, the city could have been liable for at least \$570,000 plus attorneys' fees.

Fire Forces Evacuation Of Neb. Town

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — A wildfire driven by 30 mph winds has forced the evacuation of Crookston and the closure of U.S. Highway 20 in northern Nebraska.
Valentine Fire Chief Terry Engles said the blaze started Wednesday in South Dakota and has burned its way toward the town of about 100 in Cherry County.
Nebraska Fire Marshal Ray Nance says the fire is 15 miles long, and about 3 to 5 miles wide. The flames were about three miles to east of Crookston and two miles to the west.
Nance says the fire has destroyed one abandoned building east of Crookston. Another fire in Holt County, in north-central Nebraska, has damaged two structures, but Nance says it's unclear whether those were occupied.
A third blaze was raging in southeast Nebraska's Fillmore County.

Jail Having Trouble Finding Contractor

MITCHELL (AP) — The Davison County Commission is having trouble finding a contractor to fix the showers in the county jail.
Officials say no one has submitted a bid despite repeated requests by the county.
County Commission Chairman John Claggett says all contractors are busy. But he says the jail repair would be a good winter project for a contractor, and the work needs to be done.
The Mitchell Daily Republic reports that the commission has directed county staff to start calling contractors to find someone who can do the job. The jail's shower walls have been damaged by moisture.
The commission on Tuesday also voted to spend \$5,200 to repair two cell doors that do not lock electronically and fix some other problems in the 72-bed jail.

S.F. Cracking Down On Panhandlers

SIoux FALLS (AP) — South Dakota's largest city is cracking down on panhandlers.
A new ordinance taking effect next month in Sioux Falls prohibits people from begging in an aggressive manner or in traffic. A violation would carry a \$95 fine.
The changes do not prohibit people from standing on a public sidewalk and asking others for money, as long as those being solicited are not in vehicles.
The ordinance is modeled after one in Rapid City. Police say the goal is to increase safety. Advocates for the homeless say they would rather see people's dollars going to agencies that help the needy, rather than to the homeless themselves.

Nebraska Voters Hitting Polls Early

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — The Nebraska Secretary of State's office says county election offices across the state are seeing an increase in early voting over years' past.
The office says that in Nebraska's three largest counties — Lancaster, Sarpy and Douglas — more people also have been voting early in-person.
Sarpy County Election Commissioner Wayne Bena says more than 17,000 voters have requested early ballots, while nearly 20,000 have sought early ballots in Lancaster County.
In Douglas County, 3,676 people have voted in person, and more than 54,700 have asked for early ballots, with more than 20,000 already returned.
All three counties say this election's early ballot requests have already exceeded those for the 2008 general election.
