

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures mostly rose Thursday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for December delivery rose 12.25 cents to \$8.6850 a bushel; December corn added 15.25 cents to \$7.6075 a bushel; December oats slipped 1.75 cent to \$3.94 a bushel; while November soybeans jumped 36.25 cents to \$15.4550 a bushel.

Beef and pork futures were mixed on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

December live cattle rose 0.45 cent to \$1.2805 a pound; November feeder cattle fell 0.15 cent to \$1.4912 a pound; while December lean hogs fell 0.32 cent to 78.85 cents a pound.

Entries Sought For 'Patriot's Pen' Essay Contest

Veterans of Foreign Wars (VFW) announced the kick-off of this year's VFW and its Ladies Auxiliary "Patriot's Pen Essay Competition." Middle school students in grades 6-8 in this area have the opportunity to compete in the VFW's annual essay competition and win thousands of dollars.

Students begin by competing at the local Post level. Post winners advance to District. District winners compete in the state competition.

The state winners compete for \$46,000 in awards, and the first place winner wins \$2,500. Each year, around 126,000 students participate nationwide.

Students are invited to write a 300-400-word essay on a patriotic theme. The theme for 2012-2013 (which is the 18th year of the contest) is: "What I Would Tell America's Founding Fathers."

USD Law, Business Schools Cited Among Nation's Best

VERMILLION — The Princeton Review ranks both the University of South Dakota School of Law and the Beacom School of Business among the nation's best in its annual guidebook released this week. The USD School of Law is listed among "The Best 168 Law Schools" and while the Beacom School of Business is featured in the publication's "The Best 296 Business Schools" edition.

The Princeton Review—known for its widely-followed college rankings in dozens of categories based on how students rate their schools—released the 2013 editions of its guides to law and business schools. The rankings include lists uniquely based on student surveys. The USD School of Law earned praise for having a "diverse, non-judgmental, reputable and highly knowledgeable faculty," tuition that's "fairly inexpensive," and its "excellent relationship with the state bar association, the Circuit Court, and the State Supreme Court" while the Beacom School of Business received plaudits for its "great facilities," "solid administration" and "extremely affordable" tuition.

"Each school in our books offers outstanding academics: no single law or business school is 'best' overall," said Robert Franek, senior vice president, publisher, The Princeton Review. "We present rankings in several categories and detailed profiles of the schools to give applicants broader information to decide which law or business school will be best for them."

The Princeton Review does not rank hierarchically. The publication tallied its lists based on surveys of 18,000 students attending the 168 law schools and 19,000 students attending the 296 business schools. The 80-question survey asked students to rate multiple attributes of their schools, including their professors and fellow classmates. Some rankings factored in school-reported data. All institutional data reported in the books was collected in 2011-12.

October Is Domestic Violence Awareness Month

PIERRE — October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month across the nation and a time to support the campaign against domestic violence and abuse.

"Many South Dakotans are affected by domestic violence, regardless of age, education or race," said Kim Malsam-Rysdon, secretary of the Department of Social Services. "It is important for individuals to understand the signs of abuse, so victims can get the help they need."

The South Dakota Domestic Abuse Program funds 27 shelters across the state for victims of abuse. Shelter programs offer many services, including 24-hour crisis lines, transportation, immediate and safe shelter, food, clothing, counseling and information, and referrals to other services victims may need.

Congress passed the first Domestic Violence Awareness Month commemorative legislation in 1989. National, statewide, and community-based domestic violence prevention and victim service organizations mark this month with recognition ceremonies, memorial activities, public education campaigns and community outreach events.
