Cross Country: Yankton Heads To Huron For Today's State Meet you hope everyone else wants to get betgraders, and Brandon Valley boasts three

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The 2012 Yankton Gazelles don't quite resemble the 2011 squad that claimed the Class AA state title for seventh title in nine seasons. In fact, nearly half of the team's runners in today's (Saturday) South Dakota State Cross Country Meet were not even eligible to run last season.

But that does not mean that Coach Dave Dannenbring and the Gazelles won't try to make waves.

The Gazelles graduated fourth place finisher Jenna Grossenburg (South Dakota State) and lost ninth place finisher Whitlee Larson (Jr.) to injury, but still return two placewinners from a year ago, each of which have thrust themselves into individual title contention.

"One of the funny things about athletics is, when you lose one your good ones, you hope everyone else wants to get better to fill that void," said Dannenbring.
"Annie Kruse (Jr.) and Savannah Woods (Fr.) are running extremely well. There's a threat for one of them to win state.

"When you have a good 1-2 punch, it's easier for the 3-4-5 runners to run their

Kruse, who placed 10th a year ago, and Woods, who finished 20th as an eighth grader, have taken turns leading the Gazelles since Larson went down with an injury last month. Junior Ashtyn Haak has stepped in to lead the Gazelles' second pack, which includes sophomore Tristan Roy and seventh graders Tessa Folkers, Holly Hicks and Madison McClure. If an alternate is needed today, eighth grader Kristin Rezac will step in.

YHS Works To Restore Former Glory

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From 1981 (the year South Dakota adopted a football playoff system) through 2005, Yankton traveled to the DakotaDome for the Class 11AA championship game 11 times. The Bucks claimed six state titles during that period and finished runner-up on five other occasions.

The longest "dome drought" during that 25-year period was the four years between their 1989 secondplace finish and a 1994 title.

"I think success breeds success," long-time Bucks coach Jim Miner said. "One of our advantages early was tradition that other kids, certainly Sioux Falls kids, did not have because they had more (junior high) schools and sometimes those kids weren't even sure where they were going to high school."

But since a 2005 runner-up finish to O'Gorman in the title game, the Bucks have advanced no farther than the quarterfinal round of the playoffs.

'I think it is a lot of variables,' Bucks head coach Arlin Likness said. "We have shrunk in enrollment and as a result we don't have the numbers we had 10 years ago. We had 32 seniors in 2006 and the last few years we're lucky to get 20.3

Even if Yankton has regressed as of late, there is still no doubt that the Sioux Falls metro area (Washington, Lincoln, Roosevelt, O'Gorman and Brandon Valley) has made a powerful push towards the top in recent years.

"The Sioux Falls (public) schools have been creeping up since 2000," Likness added. "In '99 we beat O'Gorman in the championship but we played an athletic Roosevelt team in the semifinals (a 23-15 Yankton victory). They were getting bigger numbers at that time and had obvious size and speed — they were getting bigger, faster and stronger.'

Bucks assistant coach Justin Olson has a unique perspective on




the subject. Olson graduated from O'Gorman in 1993 after playing on the Knights' 1991 state championship team and earned All-State Honorable Mention honors as the starting quarterback and safety his senior year in 1992. He then went on to coach for the Knights from 1996-2009 before moving to Yankton and volunteering for the Bucks in 2010. Last year he was hired as an assistant varsity coach and currently coaches the secondary and special teams units.

"Recently the Sioux Falls public schools have taken advantage of having great numbers in their programs," Olson said. "Those quality numbers creates a huge advantage. With some of the smaller rosters you might run into kids getting tired form playing both ways or if the team gets hit by injuries that could really take a toll on a smaller roster. The bigger public schools don't drop off nearly as

25-Year Dominance

While the Bucks were no stranger to "mythical" state titles prior to 1981, the advent of the playoff format to crown a champion gave Yankton their first official title in 1982 with a 10-6 victory over O'Gorman, a year after losing to the Knights in the inaugural Class 11AA title game.

This would certainly foreshadow a trend as six of Yankton's 11 title game appearances to date have come
