

Maintaining these clearances may take multiple trimmings annually. Low hanging tree branches reduce visibility for drivers, damage vehicles, make it difficult to clear streets, and damage snowplows and school

Please take a few minutes today to measure your trees, and if needed, trim any branches not meeting the clearance requirement.

Tree trimmings can be dropped off free of charge at the Transfer Station at 1200 West 23rd Street from 10/15/12 through 10/27/2012 8:00 a.m.-3:45 p.m. Monday-Saturday

contraception, which is why we made sure churches and other houses of worship, they don't have to provide it, they don't have to pay for it," Obama continued. "We worked with the Catholic hospitals and universities to find a solution that protects both religious liberty and a woman's health.

Approximately 140 people gathered at the Yankton rally with signs that read "Stand Up For Religious Freedom," "Stop Obama's HHS Mandate" and "Vote For Life And Liberty.

As the group sang songs, prayed and listened to speeches, cars occasionally honked it support. In one instance, a motorist yelled "Pro-choice!" at the crowd. Holding an American flag, Fa-

ther Ken Lulf of St. Benedict's parish in Yankton said churches are having the right to exercise their conscience taken away from

"The crux of the issue is one of freedom — the separation of church and state," he said. Nor can it be argued that peo-

ple who oppose the mandate are attempting to impose religious beliefs on others, Lulf added. "I don't see anywhere where it

says that we're telling people they can't buy birth control," he said. "It isn't an issue where we're trying to change the law for the masses as much as we're trying to protect our rights and consciences.

Dozens of lawsuits have been constitutional.

Last month, U.S. District Judge Carol Jackson dismissed a lawsuit by Frank O'Brien and his business, O'Brien Industrial Holdings, LLC (OIH). Although the business is secular, O'Brien is a Catholic who tries to operate his business in ways that are consistent with his religion. The lawsuit protested the contraception mandate.

In her judgment, Jackson

stated: "Plaintiffs remain free to exercise their religion, by not using contraceptives and by discouraging employees from using contraceptives. The burden of which plaintiffs complain is that funds, which plaintiffs will contribute to a group health plan, might, after a series of independent decisions by health care providers and patients covered by OIH's plan, subsidize someone else's participation in an activity that is condemned by plaintiffs' religion. This Court rejects the proposition that requiring indirect financial support of a practice, from which plaintiff himself abstains according to his religious principles, constitutes a substantial burden on plaintiff's religious

A belief that the fundamental rights and freedoms of Americans are being threatened brought Dr. Don Swift out to Saturday's rally.

"I think (the Obama) administration is infringing upón our religious freedoms and rights, so I wanted to show my support," he said. "This affects everybody. We look at European history and what happened when groups would stand down when another group was being persecuted. Pretty soon, every group is being persecuted. We need to stand up for each other. We're all in this together. This country was founded on religious freedom. That's why people came

Everson said she was inspired to organize the rally after attending similar Stand Up For Religious Free dom events in Pierre earlier this year. She and her friends decided Yankton residents needed to get in-

"I loved that these people were willing to come out and share this time with us," she said. "Our country today is in an important place. All Americans are passionate about their country. Maybe they just don't have the courage to step out on their own. Maybe this was perfect to motivate them
