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The numbers don't lie. Not much is going right for the University of South Dakota football team this season, especially following a second-half letdown at Missouri State and a 54-0

thrashing last week by North Dakota State.
Both sides of the ball have struggled for USD (1-6, 0-4), which travels to 15thranked Indiana State, tied for first place in the Missouri Valley Football Conference,

on Saturday in Terre Haute, Ind. The Sycamores, at 6-2 and 4-1, are well aware of what can happen, though.

"It's like every week, it doesn't matter who you play, you better bring your 'A' game or you'll be embarrassed," ISU head coach Trent Miles said Tuesday during the league media call.

In the case of the Coyotes, however, it's

When asked Tuesday what has been the biggest struggle on offense, USD coach Joe Glenn joked, "North Dakota State's de-"We've played really good teams with

excellent defenses," Glenn added. "We have four new starters on the line and a couple new tight ends that are new at it. I just have so much respect for the defenses we're seeing. Glenn said the defenses he's seen so far

through four league games have been 'cookie cutter," in that most of the formations and schemes are similar.

"Everybody has a little different wrinkle," he added. "When it's good, it's good. People play good gap-cancel defense up front and their safeties all tackle pretty darn well. If you can't make something

shake open for the pass, then they got you, and that's exactly what North Dakota State did to us."

On the other hand, USD's defense has-

n't fared quite that well. Among 121 FCS teams, the Coyotes

rank 48th in pass defense, 96th in rushing defense and 82nd in total defense. Opposing quarterback pass efficiency ratings are also the 100th-worst in the country. The Coyotes managed 76 yards of total

offense against NDSU, including four first downs and 17 yards on the ground. Part of that, Glenn said, was who they were play-

"We've been able to score some points and get some things going, but it's tough sledding when there are so many strong players and senior-laden teams," Glenn said. "That's great senior leadership, and that's when you have good defenses; veterans at the peak of their strength and ex-

Indiana State, winners of four straight, has the fifth-best defense in the country with an average of 289.89 yards per game. The Sycamores — who figure to start five seniors on that side Saturday — also rank No. 2 in scoring defense (12.38) and pass efficiency defense (90.15).

Its total offense, however, ranks 95th nationally (312.5), led by a strong rushing game with Shakir Bell (144.5).

Bell, a 5-foot-8, 185-pound junior, has rushed 206 times for 1,156 yards and nine touchdowns this season. His workload has become a topic of conversation after consecutive games of 33, 25, 26 and 28 carries.

"I see one of the best running backs in the country. He plays like a giant. He has the strongest set of legs I've ever seen, pound for pound, on a running back," Glenn said. "They know how to use him. They're doing a good job giving the guy the ball as much as he can stand it.

"He must be just as strong as you can be." About his top offensive threat, Miles said Bell squats over 600 pounds and is

"very explosive in the legs and hips."

"When you see him, he's a walking muscle," Miles added. "He's probably about four percent body fat. He's a tough, physi-

Already with as many wins as they had the previous two seasons, the Sycamores are firmly past rebuilding mode. Miles took over prior to 2008 and two years later guided ISU to the school's first winning

season since 1996.
"I credit Trent and his staff," Glenn said. "A couple years ago I talked to him, and he was down in the dumps, trying to find athletes, and he's done a great job getting it going there."

The Bucks (7-3) used that recipe once again on Tuesday night at Crane-Youngworth Field to defeat a pesky Aberdeen Central squad, 44-20, to advance to the second round of the Class 11AA football playoffs.

The Golden Eagles, who finish their season 2-8, appeared ready to make an upset bid after battling through a scoreless first period and only trailing 10-6 less than a minute before halftime. That is when Aberdeen was once again plagued by penalties.

After Golden Eagles senior quarterback scored on a one-yard dive with 33 seconds left in the half, Aberdeen was set to kick off and hopefully shut down the Bucks for the final few plays of the half while entering the locker room with the majority of momentum on their side.


