Although the team didn't win another state title, the top two runners for the Gazelles finished first and second, which has never been done in Yankton.

"The girls ran a perfect race," said Coach Dave Dannenbring.

Savannah Woods, a freshman, got first place in the meet with a time of 14:40. "The season was great, I loved how Annie and I kept improving with each other every meet, we would complain about hard practices or Saturday morning runs,

but in the end they all paid off at the state meet," said Woods.



Yankton went to Huron for the South Dakota State Cross Country Meet last Saturday, October 20, 2012.

The Bucks and Gazelles both placed 7th at State. That was an improvement for the Bucks from last year's 8th place finish at State.

The Bucks 7th place finish was led by Brice Cowman finishing 7th overall with a time of 16:24 along with Ryan Olson (17:44) and Justin Grode (18:01) who placed 36th and 46th respectively.

Cowman said this about the race, "The race felt great. I just
