tion and biotechnology. Vocational schools are also producing graduates in trade skills, she said.

"We are (training) people to meet the workforce needs of South Dakota," she said. "Yankton is a perfect example of it."

However, Allen believes the state has fallen far short in education funding, which he sees as a key to economic development.

"If we don't fund education, you will have people working for \$10 and \$11 an hour, which makes it tough to raise a family," he said. "We need to see growth through an educated workforce.'

In the House race, Bernie Hunhoff said the Legislature has cooperated on economic development issues such as tourism funding and with the wind and ethanol industries.

However, he opposes Referred Law 14 on the ballot, which would establish the Large Project Development Fund. The fund would divert \$18 million in general funds from other needs, he said. He also called for more education

and workforce training. "We have thousands of jobs open in South Dakota, and we have kids looking for jobs," he said "Why is that? They don't have the skills for the jobs. We're failing our kids."

Stotz supported state assistance for companies.

The Democrats call it corporate welfare, the Republicans call it economic development," he said. "There are times when businesses need some seed money. Sometimes, you need those special dollars."

Like Hunhoff, Gross opposes the Large Project Development Fund, which he said would divert general funds from other areas. State and local governments can tap into other funding, such as Community Development Block Grants (CDBG) or Tax Increment Fi-

> "What he found was a weakness in the security design of our sally port," he stated. "There is an emergency re-lease on the garage doors. He was able to scale the garage door, grab on to that and pull it. That allowed the door to pop open. He took off at a dead run."

Vlahakis said Hansen and another inmate had been washing cars at the time. The second inmate did not attempt to flee.

The car port is a secure area and has camera surveillance. Jail staff were not supervising the work, but they were just on the other side of a door in the adjoining booking area, Vlahakis explained.

The moment the door opened, alarms went off and members of the sheriff's office, as well as the Yankton Police Department, began a search of the area.

Police dogs were used to track Hansen's scent, but they eventually lost his trail.

Because of physical evidence, Vlahakis said authorities believe that Hansen stole an ATV that was located in a field east of Yankton along Whippoorwill Lane. He followed the Missouri River to a residence near the intersection of Highway 50 and 444th Avenue and then allegedly stole a gray and black 2010 Kia Soul with the license plate number

7CU337. The keys were in the vehicle, Vlahakis said. Hansen does not have a history of violence, according to the sheriff. He was being held in the Yankton County jail on a detainer for parole violation. Hansen had not been contacting his parole agent as required.

Vlahakis said Hansen is on parole stemming from a third-degree burglary conviction.

Authorities believe Hansen has left the immediate area. His last known address was in Sioux Falls.

Even though Hansen doesn't have a history of violence, Vlahakis said caution should be used if a member of the public encounters the escapee.

Meanwhile, Vlahakis said measures have been taken to address the security flaw in the design of the car port.

"Immediate steps were taken to remedy the problem in the short term," he stated. "In the long term, it might require a design change."
